

a wet pack, which is a hydrotherapeutic measure, he might be left there for quite some time without an attendant with him. But if he is in a hospital room of the ordinary construction and with an open door, then I think that he would require certainly to always have an attendant with him.

Mr. WILLIAMS. That is all, Doctor.

The COURT. Any questions, gentlemen?

Mr. THOMPSON. Doctor, I would like to ask you a few questions.

Cross-examination.

Q (By Mr. Thompson.) In the first place, did you note the question whether you thought he had concocted these hallucinations? Do you remember that question? A. Yes.

Q I suppose you understood by that whether he was simulating? A. Yes.

Q (Continued.) His symptoms? A. Yes.

Q You would understand by that whether he was deliberately for some intelligent purpose trying to represent that conditions existed in his brain which did not exist, wouldn't you? A. Yes.

Q Now, you were asked whether you had any means of determining whether such an event that occurred here would be in accordance with your experience that a man who had an important and intelligent purpose to serve in simulating symptoms would do so and then shortly afterwards describe his own actions and his symptoms as crazy and due to prejudice, would that seem to you a natural way to simulate or a successful method of simulating symptoms? A. Well, I suppose that is a question as to what I think is a common sense way of simulating insanity rather than
