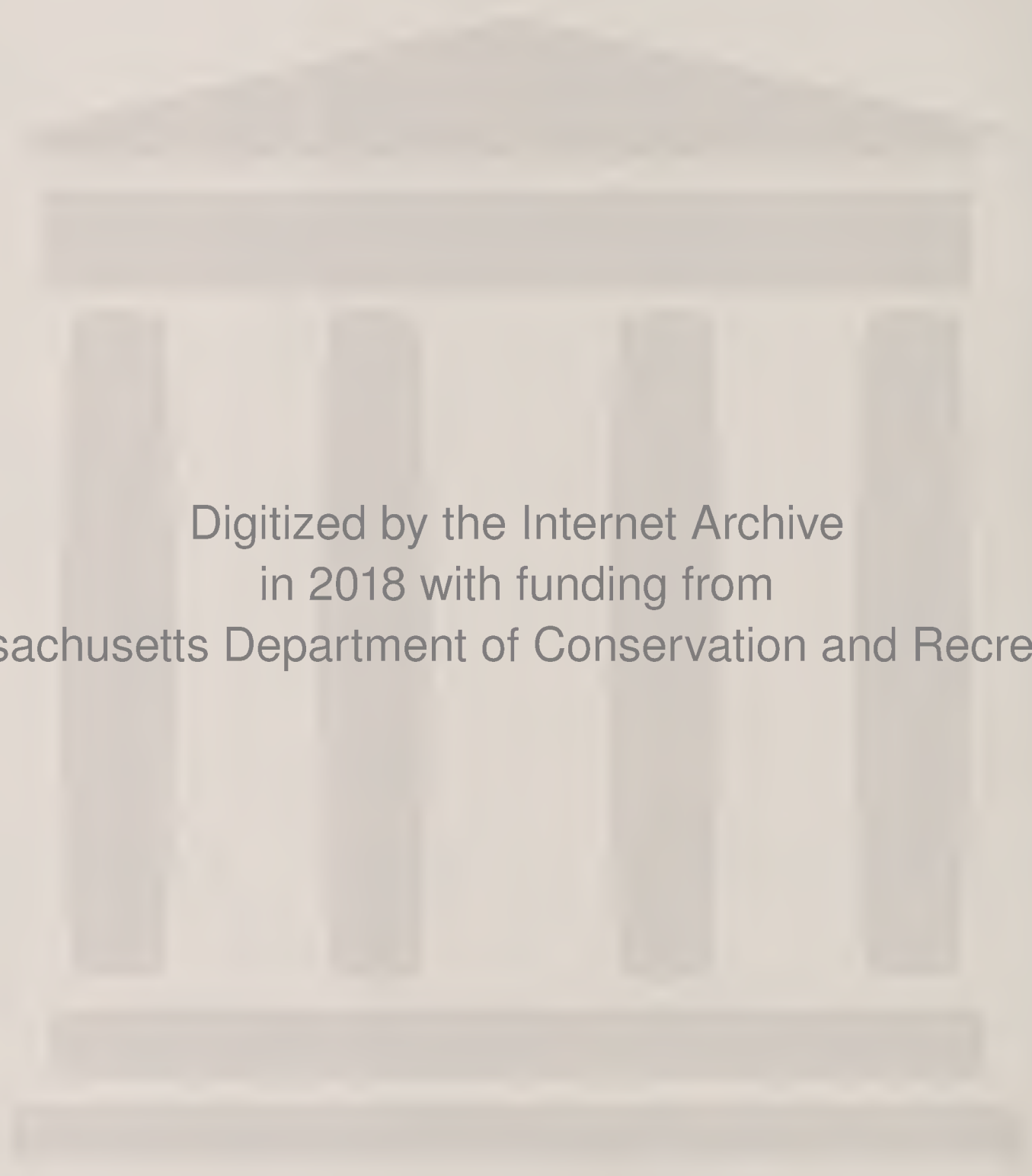

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Record of the Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-Fifth (2745th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, May 31, 1972, at 9:30 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears, and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

- 1 The Secretary submitted for signature Permit to Citadel Construction Corporation for use of M.D.C. land in Malden (Malden-Medford Line Brook Flood Control Project).
The Commission V O T E D: Held over.
- 2 The Secretary submitted for signature Transfer of Care and Control to the City of Boston of a portion of Cambridge Street near Charles Street Circle.
The Commission V O T E D: Held over.

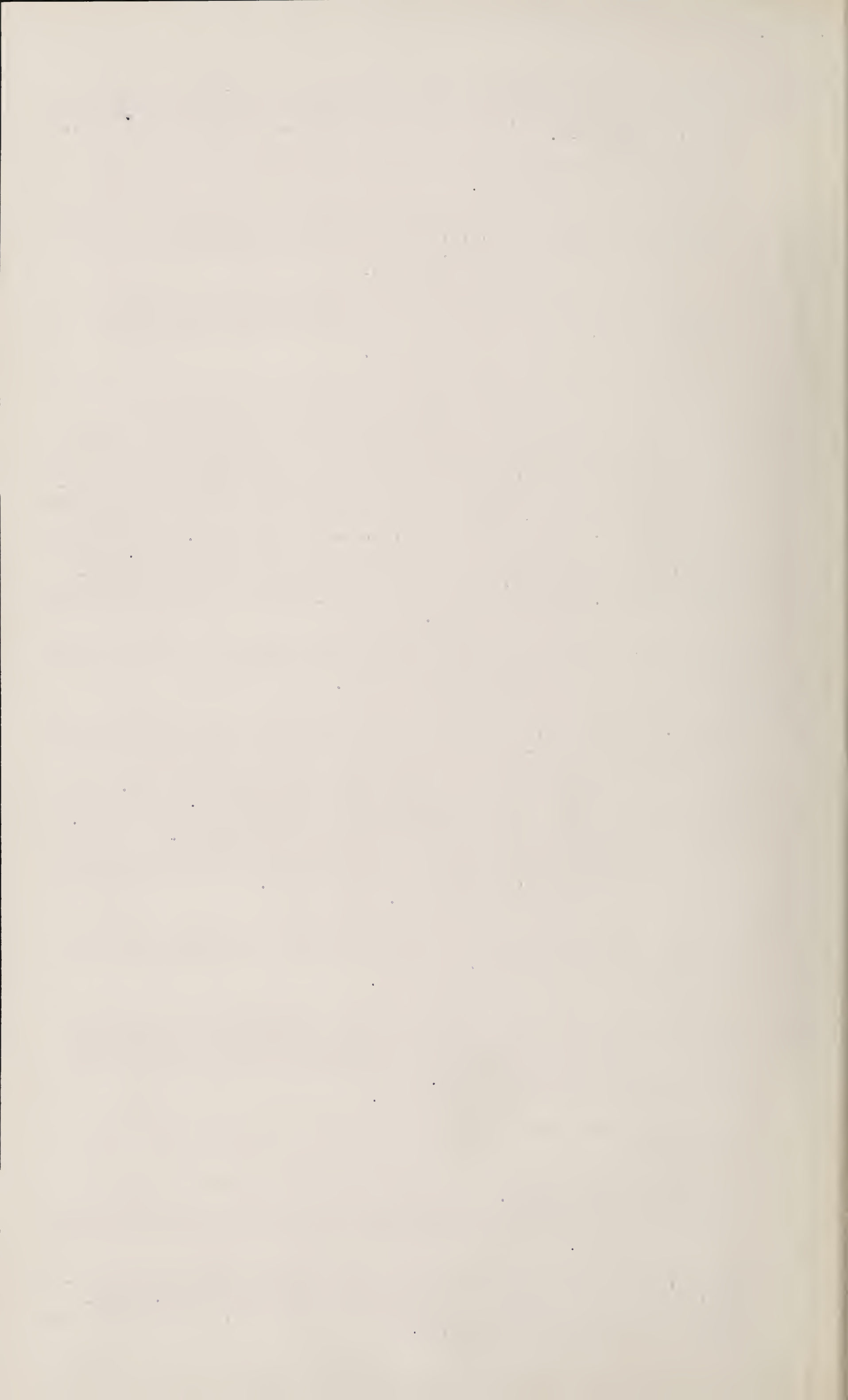
AGREEMENT

Commissioner Sears spoke of the devotion "Andy" showed towards his job, always doing his best at every opportunity presented him. He earned the respect and high regard of all who knew him.
The members of the Commission regret his passing and extend to Mrs. Bullock and members of his family their deepest sympathy.

Record of the Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Forty-Seventh (2747th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, June 14, 1972, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears, and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding Meeting were read and approved.

The Acting Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners:

- 3 Sewerage Division Contract No. 252-S, dated June 14, 1972, with J. W. Praught Company, for installation of heating system, East Boston Maintenance Yard Building, East Boston, Massachusetts.

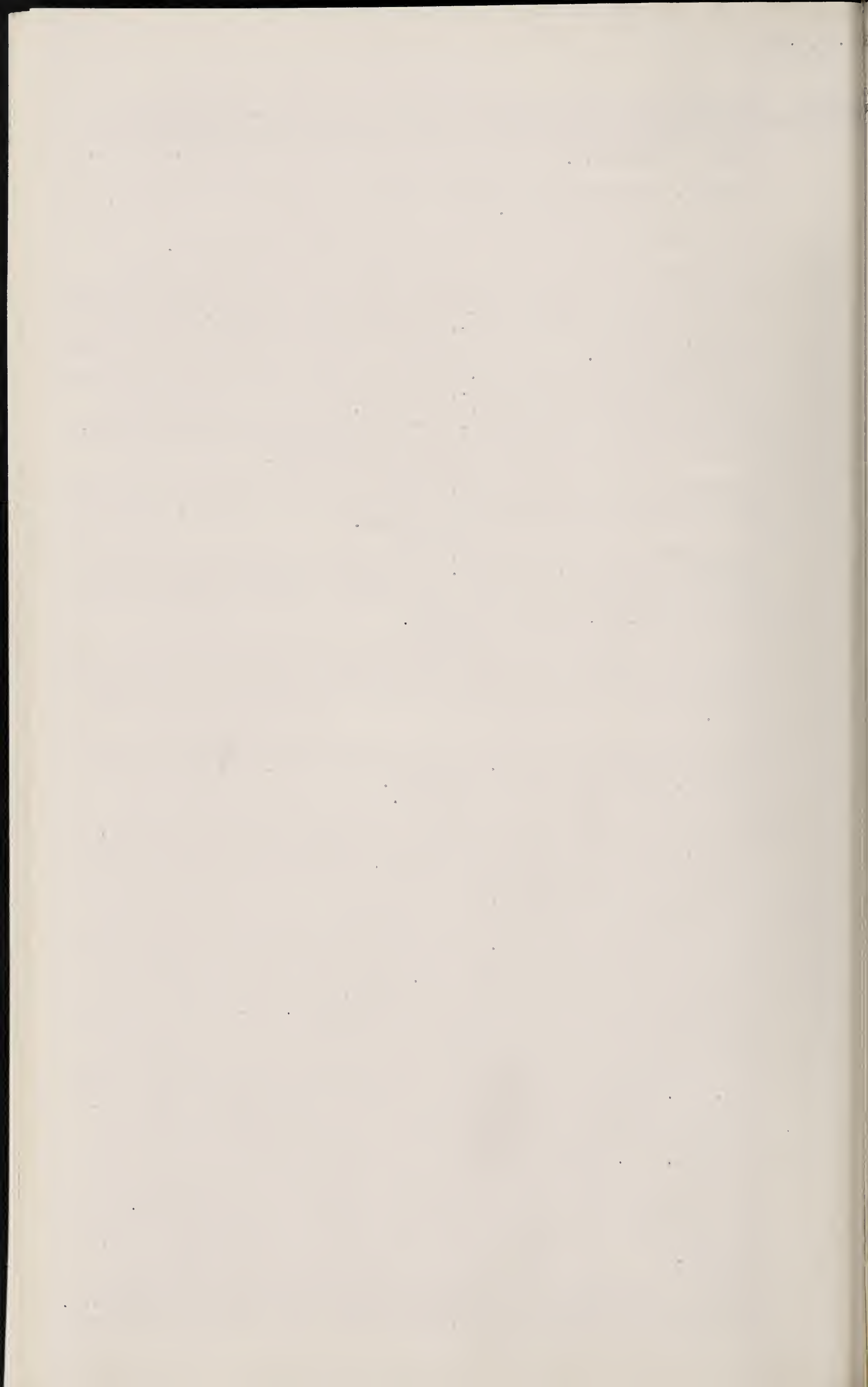

Mr. Zilber brought in a new version of the payment schedule known as Exhibit B, which showed an estimated cost of \$869,770.00

The Commissioner reported that the estimated cost was substantially higher than that which the parties had contemplated during their deliberation on the contract. The Chief Engineer advised the Commission that he felt we should proceed because the job has to be done. Then the Commission made it clear to Mr. Zilber that it was their understanding that the interest cost (\$149,000.00) would be substantially reduced if we could make an expeditious payment. Mr. Wright reminded the Commission that if it signed the Agreement now, they were protected, in view of the language contained in Article 3 on Page 4, which says that it is agreed that all payments are subject to prior approval of the Attorney General, the Comptroller, and the Governor's Council. Mr. Zilber stated that the Companies took seriously their obligation to negotiate in good faith, and it was understood by all parties that efforts would immediately be made to achieve the main and underlying agreement, as both parties will be harmed if such is not the case. Mr. Zilber agreed that the present intention of the Companies was to seek an amended license including the water supply part of the project and further stated that there was some evidence that Stone & Webster had already begun preliminaries to construction. He also agreed to set an execution date of June the 16th and hand deliver the agreement to the Consortium's head office in Connecticut today, June 14.

Commissioner Lyman expressed, for the Commission, his satisfaction that the arrangements will enable the Companies to build the intake structure in the dry and lead to a saving of approximately \$300,000.00. The Commission indicated to Mr. Zilber that it had been willing to ap-



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proach the Attorney General in advance in an effort to obtain some premonition as to his reaction and wished it might have been possible for the Companies to make a similar approach to the FPC. Mr. Zilber's answer reflected his assumption that the FPC was aware of the water supply element because the Companies had changed the size of the basin and built the footings, and the subject had come up at public hearings, but they would not be in a position to seek an advance reaction from the FPC, and hoped that we would rely on the "good faith" bargaining clause.

The Commission made it clear to Mr. Zilber that we wanted to create a 1972 main agreement between the parties, rather than rehashing the 1968 or 1970 agreements. (See Volume 38, Page 22, Item 3)

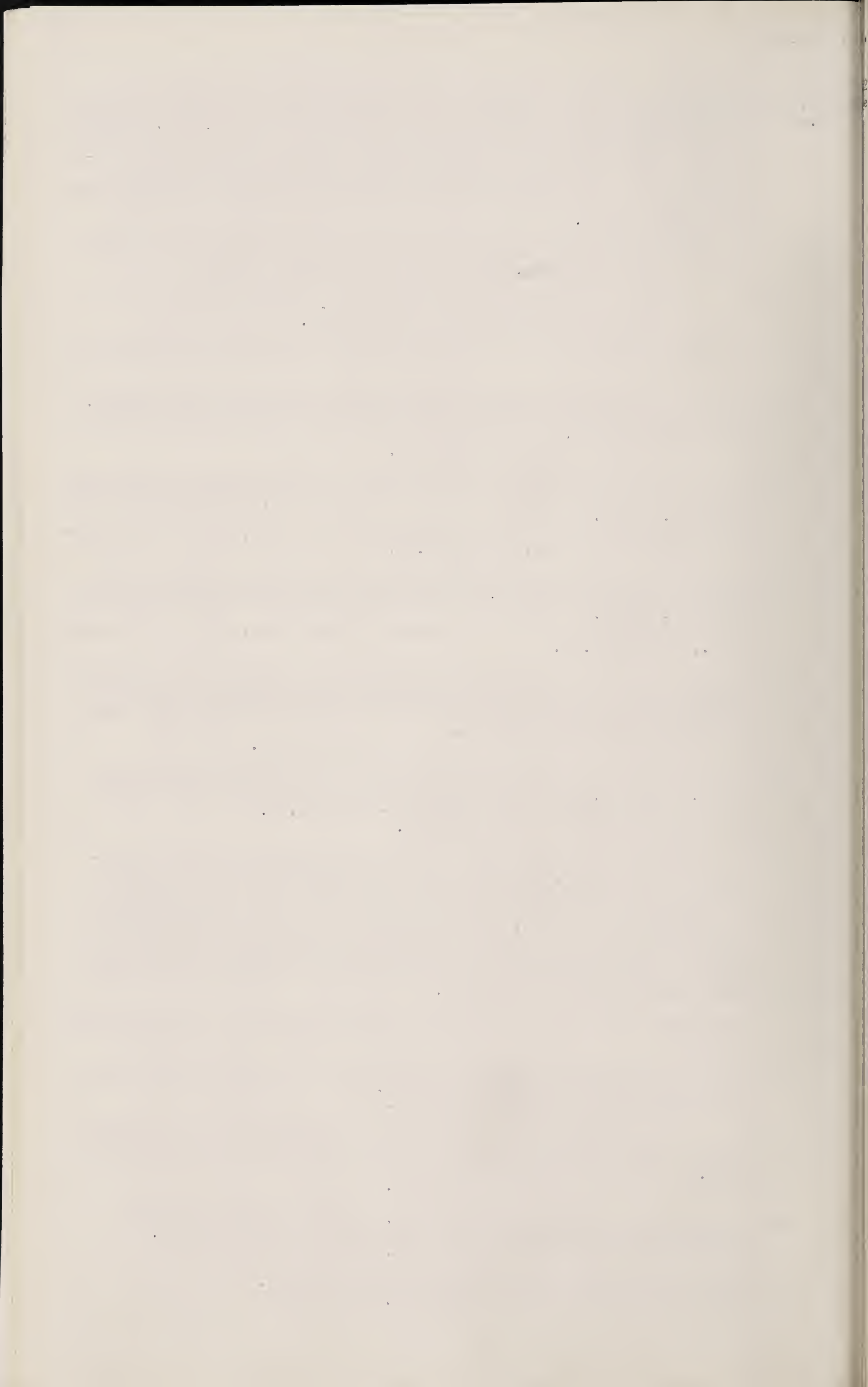

 5. Sydney and Winn Development Associates shall simultaneously convey the parcel by quitclaim deed to the Commission in exchange for land of equal value and for other non-monetary consideration.
 6. The Commission shall simultaneously convey the area containing the existing Little League Field to Sydney and Winn Development Associates together with the right to use as an access or fire road the existing road at the rear of Hornel Stadium.

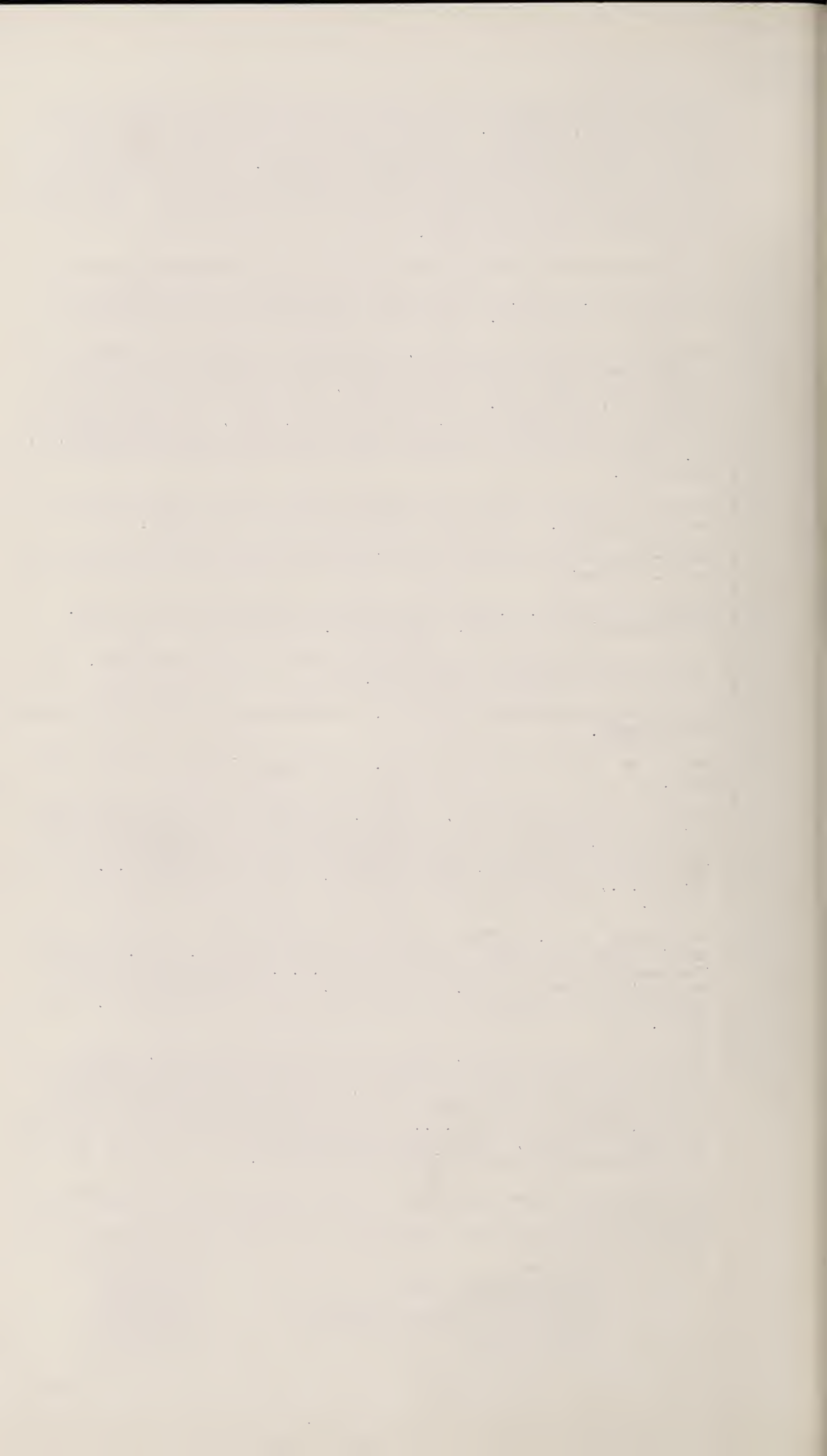

The Boston Edison Company shall do the work of installing said manholes and conduit, with the necessary wires, cables, transformers, and related apparatus therein, in the location hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner and location and in all other respects.
3. Said Boston Edison Company shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.
4. Said Boston Edison Company shall protect and maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was at the time of this grant and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condition to the satisfaction of said Director.
5. The Boston Edison Company shall place and maintain proper barriers at all times and from the beginning of twilight through the whole of every night sufficient lights to protect the public from injury or damage during the progress of the work under this grant or during repairs upon said manholes and conduit, with the necessary wires, cables, transformers, and related apparatus therein, and work on the location which may hereafter become necessary.
6. No work shall be done under this grant without first obtaining a permit therefor from said Director of Park Engineering and subject to conditions imposed by him.

1 A hearing was held with officials of Member Cities and Towns of the Metropolitan Sewerage District, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 92, Section 1A, and Section 5A, of the General Laws, on the proposed revised schedule of the ratios of apportionment of debt service and maintenance costs for the cities and towns in the Metropolitan Sewerage District, dated August 14, 1972. Following the hearing, the Commission V O T E D to establish the revised schedule of ratios of apportionment of debt service and maintenance, dated August 14, 1972, as required by Section 5A of Chapter 92.

Following the presentation, the Commission V O T E D to express its preference of lower buildings on the ocean front and, after making suitable arrangements with the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority as to parking, and with the City of Revere, or Developer acceptable to both, as to compensation and conformity with the City's plan for the rehabilitation of the Revere Beach Area. The Commission further V O T E D to express its preference of high-rise buildings on the land side of Ocean Avenue.

Record of the Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixtieth (2760th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, September 27, 1972, at 10:00 A.M..

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

1 The Secretary submitted for signature Lease to WGBH Educational Foundation of land and facilities on Great Blue Hill, for one year beginning October 1, 1972, and terminating on September 30, 1973. The Commission V O T E D: Held over.

2 The Secretary submitted for signature an Agreement with Boston & Maine Corporation to cross its land in Somerville, at Engineering Station 134+19, for access to the Amelia Earhart Dam, at an annual rental fee of \$50.00. The Commission V O T E D: Held over.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners:

3 Contract Agreement with JBF Scientific Corporation for consultant services in connection with the design and installation of an aeration system in the Charles River, upstream of Havy Beach.

4 Contract Agreement between the Metropolitan District Commission and Stephen H. Kaiser for Traffic Consultant services for the period October 2, 1972 - June 30, 1973.

Beginning at a point in the southeasterly side line of Harbor Street, which point is distant northwesterly measuring along said side line, three hundred twenty-five and 51/100 (325.51) feet from the intersection of Shephard Street and Harbor Street as shown on the aforesaid plan; thence bounded

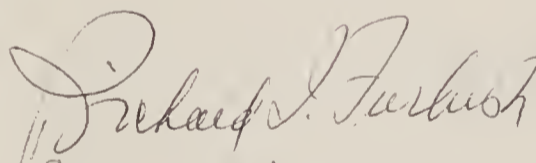

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Record of the Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-Second (2782nd) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, March 21, 1973, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved, as corrected.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners:

1 Contract No. 2249, with Bayonne Construction Co., Inc., for development of West End Park, Charles River Reservation, Boston.

2 LICENSE

VOTED: To grant a license to the Massachusetts Electric Company to use the land situated in the Towns of West Boylston, Holden and Rutland in the County of Worcester, shown on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metropolitan District Water Supply Commission, Map of West Boylston-White Valley, 22,000 volt transmission line, May 10, 1927, New England Power Construction Co., Engineer, Worcester, Mass.", for a transmission line for the transmission of high and low voltage current and for private telephone use, and to execute an indenture accordingly.

3 A hearing was given to a representative of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company on its petition for grant of location for approximately 1000 feet of underground conduit and cable therein, and 2 manholes, in Arsenal Street, Watertown.

The Commission V O T E D: Approved, at a one-time flat fee of \$1500. ORDERED that, on petition of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated February 22, 1973, for location shown on plan of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company dated November 14, 1972, and indexed accession number 48008M, for approximately 1000 feet of underground conduit and cable therein, and two manholes, in Arsenal Street, Watertown, on the southwesterly side from the southwesterly intersection of Greenough Boulevard easterly, to be used for the transmission of intelligence by electricity, said location being under the care and control of this Commission, and found by order of the Department of Public Utilities to be required by public convenience and necessity, said plan and petition being on file in the office of the Commission, a hearing on said petition having been given by this Commission on Wednesday, March 21, 1973, at 9:55 A.M., at the office of the Commission in Boston, of which hearing due notice was given to all persons interested of the time and place by publishing a copy of said petition and the order of notice issued thereon by this Commission in newspapers published in the Town of Watertown, being the town in which the location petitioned for would lie, the first publication having been made at least fourteen days prior to the date of said hearing, and it appearing, in the opinion of this Commission, that public convenience and necessity so require, said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company is hereby granted a location for said underground conduit and cable therein, and two manholes, in said Arsenal Street, to the extent and upon the terms, conditions and obligations hereinafter specified, the same being such as the public necessity and a due regard for the rights of the Commonwealth require, namely:-

1. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall conform to all provisions of law applicable to the exercise of the rights and performance of the work under this grant and to the rules and regulations of the Metropolitan District Commission.

2. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall do the work of installing said conduit, cable, and manholes in the location hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner and location and in all other respects.

3. Said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.

4. Said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall protect and



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maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was at the time of this grant and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condition to the satisfaction of said Director.

5. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall place and maintain proper barriers at all times and from the beginning of twilight through the whole of every night sufficient lights to protect the public from injury or damage during the progress of the work under this grant or during repairs upon said underground conduit, cable, and manholes, and work on the location which may hereafter become necessary.

ORDERED that, on petition of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated March 9, 1973, for location shown on plans of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated January 5, 1973, and indexed accession numbers 48064X, 48065X, and 48066X, for approximately 1,340 feet of underground conduit and cable therein, and one manhole, in Concord Avenue and Fresh Pond Parkway, Cambridge, to be used for the transmission of intelligence by electricity, said location being under the care and control of this Commission, and found by order of the Department of Public Utilities to be required by public convenience and necessity, said plans and petition being on file in the office of the Commission, a hearing on said petition having been given by this Commission on Wednesday, April 4, 1973, at 9:55 A.M., at the office of the Commission in Boston, of which hearing due notice was given to all persons interested of the time and place by publishing a copy of said petition and the order of notice issued thereon by this Commission in newspapers published in the City of Cambridge, being the city in which the location petitioned for would lie, the first publication having been made at least fourteen days prior to the date of said hearing, and it appearing, in the opinion of this Commission, that public convenience and necessity so require, said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company is hereby granted a location for said underground conduit and cable therein, and one manhole, in said Concord Avenue and Fresh Pond Parkway, to the extent and upon the terms, conditions and obligations hereinafter specified, the same being such as the public necessity and a due regard for the rights of the Commonwealth require, namely:-

1. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall conform to all provisions of law applicable to the exercise of the rights and performance of the work under this grant and to the rules and regulations of the Metropolitan District Commission.

2. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall do the work of installing said conduit, cable, and manholes in the location hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner and location and in all other respects.

3. Said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.

4. Said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall protect and maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was at the time of this grant and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condi-

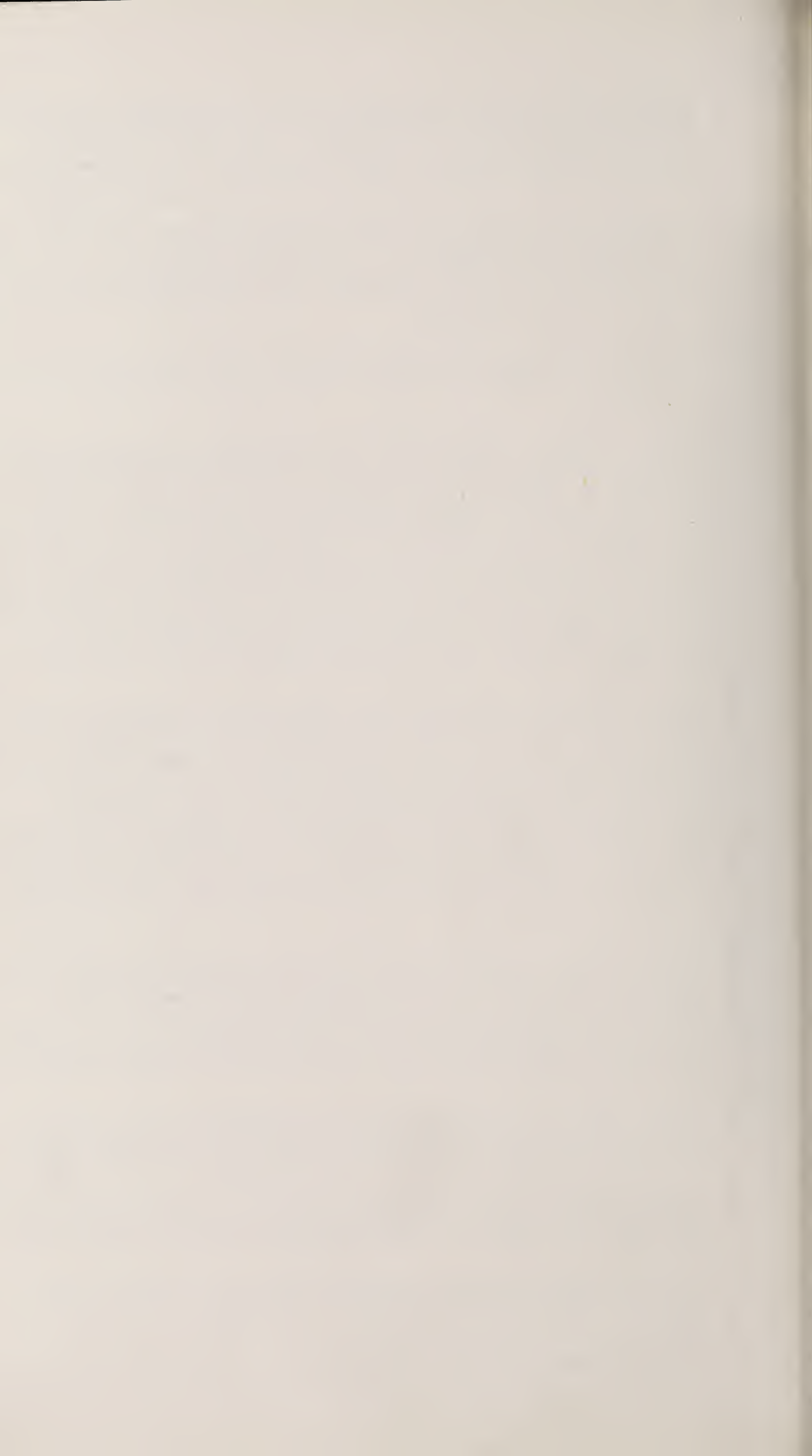

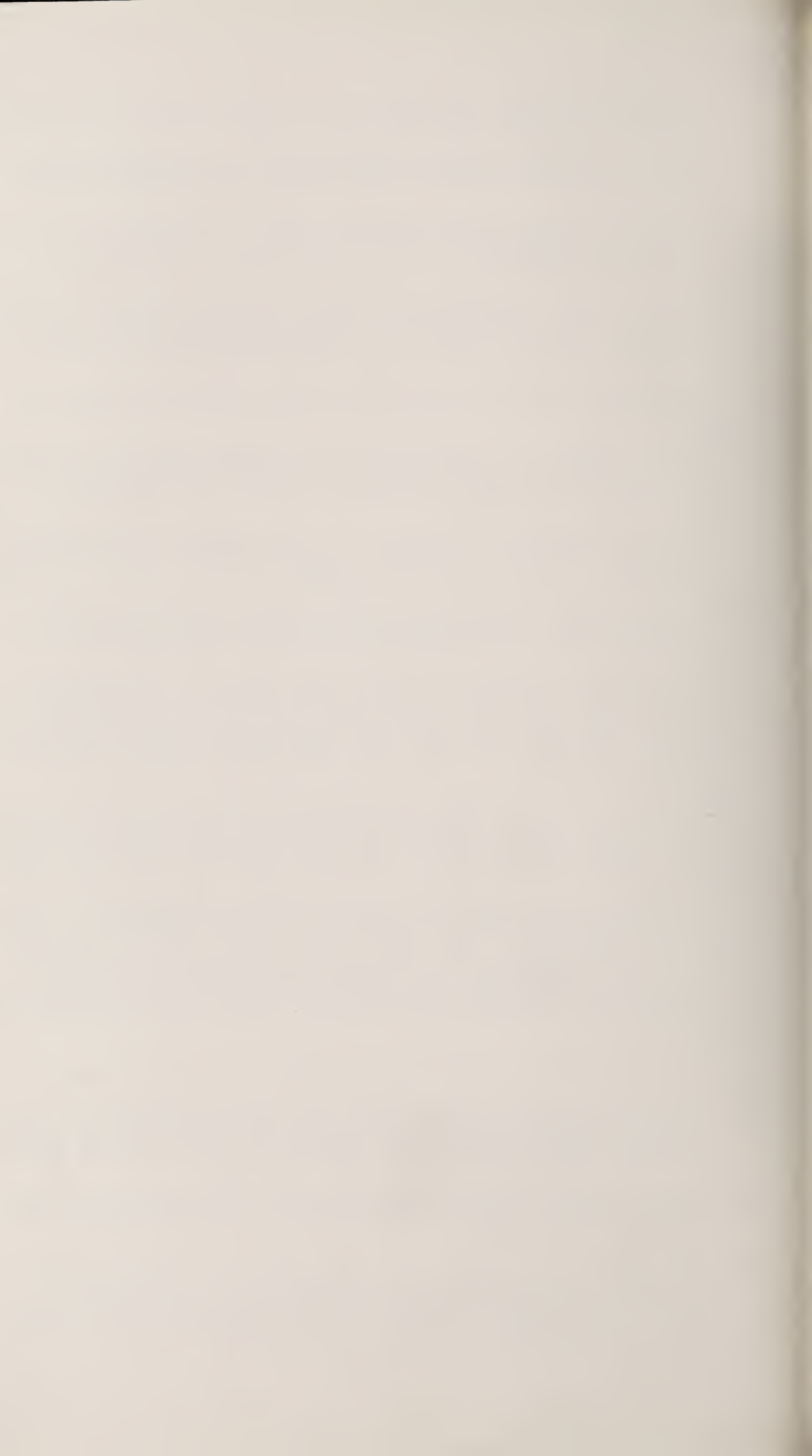

ORDER OF TAKING
COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, April 4, 1973.

ORDERED: That the Metropolitan District Commission by virtue of the power and authority conferred upon it by Chapter 589 of the Acts of 1968 and Chapter 452 of the Acts of 1969, and acts in amendment thereof or in addition thereto, and every other power and authority hereto enabling, for the purpose of said Acts, does hereby order the taking of and does hereby take in fee under the provisions of Chapter 79 of the General Laws, in the name and behalf of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the land situated in Lynn in the County of Essex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, shown on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metropolitan District Commission, Park Engineering, Lynnway - Lynn, Plan of Taking from Hansen Investment Trust * * * March 1, 1973, Mason J. Condon, Director of Park Engineering," being plan accession number 47986-V.T., a copy of which shall be recorded with a copy of this order in the Essex South District Registry of Deeds and made a part of this order, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the southeasterly side line of Harbor Street, which point is distant northwesterly measuring along said side line, three hundred twenty-five and 51/100 (325.51) feet from the intersection of Shephard Street and Harbor Street as shown on the aforesaid plan; thence bounded

NORTHWESTERLY by Harbor Street, one hundred forty (140) feet;

NORTHEASTERLY by land of owners unknown, thirty-eight (38) feet more or less;
