Page 2864.

DOMINIC RICCI

Saw Sacco on platform of Stoughton Station between 7:15 and 7:40.

- Sacco says he took train at 8:56

I left him at the station.

Saw Sacco about quarter past seven the morning of April 16th at the factory.

Had a talk with him about the hold-up and murder in South Braintree.

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Page 3394

Felice Guadagni

Saw Sacco at Boni's, April 15th.

We left about half past one.

Saw him again at Giardano's Coffee House about three o'clock.

Remembers it was the 15th because in that day I had some discussion about a banquet which was given to Mr. Williams, the Editor of the Boston Transcript, and I had some discussion about that banquet with Bosco first, and Professor Dentamore afterwards in the Coffee House. I was invited to that banquet.

Q When was the banquet to be?

A Thenight of the 15th.

Page 3409. The 15th is in his mind because that day I was invited to a banquet.

Q What had that to do with Sacco?

A Because at the time that Sacco came in I was talking about this banquet in the restaurant.

Q Is that the only banquet you have ever been invited to?

A Yes, sir.

~~NOTE: Witness says Saccocame into the restaurant at 12:30.~~

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Page 3445

ANTONIO DENTAMORE

Saw Sacco at 2:45 P. M. in Giordani's Coffee House. Know I saw him that day because I went to the banquet in honor of Editor Williams of the Transcript.

Banquet was held about noon time.

CROSS EXAMINATION.

Q Have you given all the reasons, Mr. Dentamore, why you recall the date, April 15th?

A Well, not all. There is another reason.

Q What is the other reason?

A Well, about an argument I had with Mr. Guardagni about that banquet.

Q What time did you have the argument with Guardagni?

A It was about quarter of three.

Q What time was that banquet due to start?

A Twelve o'clock.

Q How long did it last?

A Oh, a couple of hours.

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Page 3460.

CARLOS M. AFFE.

NOTE: Credibility depends upon appearance of book.

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Met Sacco and Guardagno in Boni's between twelve and one o'clock. Remembers because of conversation with Guardagno in regard to a banquet that evening to Williams. "When I saw the picture in the paper and Mr. Guardagni spoke to me about it, I went and looked back to the paper, and I discovered that that was the ~~nixt~~ evening of the banquet."

NOTE:- Witness was not invited.

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ANGELO MONELLO

Page 2844.

Met Sacco on Hanover St. on the 15th.

Remembers because the next Sunday, April 18th was a play by a great artist from New York, name Mimi Aguglia. The play was "Madame X."

NOTE:- Does not remember with whom he talked about the play on any other date.

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Saw Sacco at Boni's between 1:15 and 1:30.

"I was treating at the time with Dr. Gibbs, and I recalled that the same day I took dinner there I made a visit to him, and I went to his office."

Q How frequently in the months of March, April and May, 1920 did you visit Doctor Gibbs?

A I should say on an average once a week

NOTE:- Witness can not recall next visit prior to April 15th or the dates of any other visits.

NOTE:- Doctor Gibbs testified he treated Williams on April 15th and next before that on the 31st of March.

Next after April 15th on May 7th, and next on June 26th.

That some time in April or May of this year, Williams called and asked to see my records.

DEFENSE ALIBI.

Vznettti.

As to Vanzetti's alibi, the backbone of it was the Corl
and Morey testimony. And Morey destroyed that.

ALIBI WITNESSES.

DIRECT EXAMINATION

JOSEPH ROSEN.

Page 2599.

Left Boston on 6:37 train.

Arrived Plymouth 7:50.

Went to Ventura's restaurant, for Breakfast.

Arrived Seaside by street car 9:30.

Had a valise and hand bag full of men's suitings in right hand
had small valise in left hand.

Met Vanzetti corner of Castle and Main Street at 12:00 O'clock.

Whistles were blowing. Went to a house two blocks off.

CROSS EXAMINATION:-

Q When was the last time you were in Plymouth before today.

A The last time was April 15, 1920.

Q You haven't been down there this year,

A No, sir.

Eight to ten weeks after shooting he first knew of Vanzetti's
arrest.

He sold a Greek at an ice-cream parlor in sea-side palm beach
cloth the same day.

Sold a milkman in Seaside.

Sold to party in Plymouth.

Sold to the Greek about 10:15. Left store ten minutes after.

Sold the milkman around 11:00 o'clock. Took about five minutes.

Ten minutes to sell the Greek.

After selling Greek rested ten minutes. Rested outside just
about a block away on a side street. Sat on my small valise ten
or twelve minutes.

Next sale around three o'clock on Middle St., Plymouth.

Called on wife of Chief of Police. She was washing.

Called next house and made a sale with a lady. Her husband told me he was working for the Cordage. Was a tall blonde-looking lady thirty-eight or forty years old. Saw an antique-looking piece of furniture and asked her what that was.

Then went to Ventura's restaurant and had a light lunch.

Missed 3:45 train.

Stayed at Ventura's three quarters of an hour.

Took a stroll around Main St. and the Post office.

Got back to Ventura's ten minutes of six.

Q You haven't been down there this year?

A Not yet.

Q *Did you say you met Vanzetti once before that day?*

A About two months before.

Q Yes, when was that?

A Well, I can't tell you correctly the date.

Q What month was it?

A I don't know.

Q What day of the month?

A I can't tell you.

Q What day of the week?

A I can't tell you that either.

Q What time of the day?

A Well, I should say it was in the afternoon.

Q What time in the afternoon?

A Well, about two o'clock.

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Q Did you sell anybody else in Plymouth on that other occasion?

A I sold it to the same lady.

Q What lady?

A Sold to the same lady just in the Cherry Street house.

Q Sell anybody else?

A Not on the street, correctly.

Q Any place in Plymouth?

A It's kind of too hard to remember, you know.

Q What?

A Kind of hard to remember.

Q It's pretty hard to remember any day except the fifteenth of day of April, isn't it?

A Well, I remember that, yes.

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What day of the month is today?

A If I shouldn't tell you and lie, I think it would be the 27th or 28th.

Q Which is it?

A I don't keep track of it. I think it is either the 27th or 28th.

Later he says he has been to Plymouth several times since he last saw Vanzetti.

NOTE:- Produces tax receipt, dated April 15th, 1920.

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Page 2603.

MRS. BRINI.

Vanzetti lived at her house four years.

Q Between the 15th day of April and the Defendant Vanzetti's arrest did you give any thought to where he was twenty days before his arrest?

A No, sir.

Remembers the 15th because called up the nurse at the Cordage on the 14th, and nurse visited her on the 15th.

Also refers to Dr. Shurtleff's visits on the 14th and the 16th. Has no bill from the Doctor showing dates of visits.

Page 2628.

LeFAVRE BRINI.

Remembers April 15th because it was just one week after I left my work to take care of my mother.

Also because that morning my father called the nurse for my mother.

NOTE: Mrs. Brini, Page 2610, says the nurse at Cordage was called on the morning of the 14th, while daughter says on Page 2630, the nurse was called the morning of the 15th.

NOTE: Need not quote any of this witness's testimony. Refer to it all for the perusal of the Court.

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Page 2647.

MELVIN CORL.

Saw Vanzetti on the 15th around two o'clock.

Remember it on account of painting my boat, and I was going to put it in the following day, but it wasn't completed, and I put it in on the 17th, my wife's birthday. I had been working on it practically the whole week.

CROSS EXAMINATION:

Vanzetti a customer of witness since August, 1919.

Q What day did you start painting your boat?

A I should say it was around probably the 12th or 13th or April.

Q Is there any relationship between your wife's birthday and the date you put a boat in the water?

A No, only she made the remark I put it in on her birthday.

NOTE: Witness can not tell name of any other person who stopped and talked with him while painting the boat, or the time anybody stopped, except Jessie and Holmes who were in and out all the time.

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Page 2849.

MRS. MELVIN CORL.

Q Did you see the boat during the week of April 17th, 1920.

A I did.

Q What date?

A I am not positive of the date.

Q What is your best recollection as to the date?

A A couple of nights or so before the 17th of April.

Q Where did you see the boat?

A Down on the shore.

Q Whether or not it had been painted?

A It had been.

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Page 2856.

JOSEPH MOREY.

towed

Corl had my boat for me on April 17th.

CROSS EXAMINATION.

Page 2858.

Has your attention ever been called since the day the boat was towed to the date?

A No, sir, it hasn't. Not until this morning.

Q Who called your attention to it this morning?

A I was talking with Mrs. Corl on our way up.

Q Did you remember it right off?

A No, I did not.

Q Did somebody tell you what it was?

A Yes.

Q Who told you?

A Mrs. Corl and I talked it over and decided that was the date.

Q You decided that was the day??

A We weren't sure of it.

Q You weren't sure? of

A She wasn't sure.

Q She wasn't sure?

A Yes.
