

Q And your examination, so far as it is personal on your part, has been made, I understand, at the Boston Psychopathic Hospital where the defendant Sacco was committed for observation?

A. Yes.

Q Your personal observation has continued over a time from March 17, 1923, to the present time? A. Yes.

Q And the defendant Sacco is now -- is still in the Boston Psychopathic Hospital? A. Yes.

Q Doctor, in connection with or as the result of your observation, you have written two letters to his Honor in the nature of reports on the defendant's condition. A. I have.

Q And copies of those letters you have just heard me read in Court? A. Yes.

Mr. WILLIAMS. If your Honor please, May I have for the moment that first letter? I can easily obtain your own.

The COURT. I think so (handing paper to Mr. Williams). I have found mine. Thank you.

Q Your first report was rendered, Doctor, after a period of observation of substantially 10 days to two weeks? A. Yes.

Q And as your report states, that report was based simply on your personal observation? A. Yes.

Q I understand that at that time you had not conferred with Drs. Cahoon, Thomas and Myerson? A. No, sir.

Q And had not heard from them what they had observed prior to the commitment to the Psychopathic Hospital, as to the defendant's condition? A. No.

Q Your conclusion was, as expressed in your letter of March 26th, that your observation resulted in your finding no evidence of insanity of any type in the defendant Sacco? A. Yes.
