A Proclamation

His Excellency Governor Deval L. Patrick

Whereas Concussions occur from a direct hit to the head that causes the brain to shake within the skull resulting in the damage of blood vessels and nerves; and

Whereas Symptoms of a concussion include confusion, head ache, blurred vision, and in the most extreme cases, vomiting and loss of consciousness can occur; and

Whereas According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), concussions account for nearly one in 10 sports injuries; and

Whereas The CDC estimates there are as many as 3.8 million sports and recreation related concussions each year in the United States; and

Whereas The Sports Concussion Institute estimates that for young people ages fifteen to twenty-four years, sports are the second leading cause of traumatic brain injury behind only motor vehicle crashes; and

Whereas Protective equipment, including helmets, padding, and mouth guards reduces the likelihood of experiencing a concussion; and

Whereas All local high schools in Massachusetts are required to receive mandatory training in the identification, treatment and care of athletic concussions; and

Whereas Through public awareness, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts seeks to inform our residents about this serious injury, the safety precautions which can prevent such injuries,

Now, Therefore, I, Deval L. Patrick, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, do hereby proclaim November 2011, to be,

ATHLETIC CONCUSSION AWARENESS MONTH

And urge all the citizens of the Commonwealth to take cognizance of this event and participate fittingly in its observance.
