

second report, April 10, what facts with reference to the defendant' Sacco's condition did you yourself observe which had not been observed by you prior to your trip to Worcester?

A. He has made many references to hallucinatory experiences, whereas prior to the trip to Worcester he had never given any indication of hallucinatory experiences. That is to say, he said he heard voices, and he explained certain impulsive behavior by the statement that he was re-acting to voices which he heard. With regard to his attitude towards detention in the hospital and his attitude to awaiting the due process of law, he showed persistency and a fixed attitude which was never in the slightest modified by any statements that were made as to the actual situation and the necessity of awaiting due process of law.

Q You refer to threats of suicide. A. He also repeated several times that he would very definitely at a fixed period commit suicide unless he were unconditionally free.

Q Had he made, so far as your own knowledge goes, any threats of suicide prior to your trip to Worcester? A. He had frequently talked of ending it all, and on the night -- the behavior of which is described in my first report -- he had had an emotional condition in which he struck himself on the chair, struck his head rather severely several times against a heavy chair. Behavior of that type could be interpreted as an attempt at suicide. On the other hand, it might be looked upon as more or less of a transitory emotional episode without there being any definite suicidal motive behind it. And on the morning after that episode he passed over it very casually and wished no reference to be made to it. After the trip to Worcester
