Record of the Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-Ninth (2789th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, May 2, 1973, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved, as corrected.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners:

DEED

VOTED: to grant a confirmatory deed conveying to Robert E. Townsend and Ruth M. Townsend a parcel of land in Melrose in the County of Middlesex containing one thousand seven hundred thirty-seven (1,737) square feet and shown as Parcel C on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metropolitan District Commission, Parks Division, Lynn Fells Parkway, Melrose, Plan of land between Lynn Fells Parkway and Perkins Street, * * * March 21, 1958, Benjamin W. Fink, Director of Park Engineering," being plan acc. number 36654-V.T., reserving the right to maintain a storm drain in a strip of land fifteen (15) feet in width as shown on said plan and to release the slope rights created by a deed from George Phillips Bryant to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts dated November 21, 1906 and recorded with Middlesex South District Deeds Book 3283, Page 504, and the slope rights, building line restrictions and other rights reserved in a deed from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to Edgar L. Fuller dated December 22, 1915, and recorded with said Deeds Book 4029, Page 449, and to execute a deed accordingly.

Contract No. 2271, with Salem Engineering & Construction Corp., for repairs and improvements to the Pavilion at Nantasket Beach, Nantasket Beach Reservation.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following paper which was executed by the Commissioner and three Associate Commissioners:

DEED

VOTED: to rescind its action of April 4, 1973 ordering the taking of Lots X, Y and Z containing six hundred thirty (630) square feet, twelve thousand three hundred sixty (12,360) square feet, and five thousand six hundred (5,600) square feet, more or less, respectively, situated in Lynn in the County of Essex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts as shown on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metropolitan District Commission, Park Engineering, Lynnway - Lynn, Plan of Taking from Hansen Investment Trust * * * March 1, 1973, Mason J. Condon, Director of Park Engineering," being plan accession number 47986-V.T., from H. Harold Hansen, Trustee of Hansen Investment Trust, and to reconvey said Lots X, Y and Z to said H. Harold Hansen, Trustee of Hansen Investment Trust, and to execute a deed accordingly.

The Commission V O T E D to approve entering into a contract agreement with Mr. Bruce C. L. Pratt for services as an Administrator and Supervisor of Georges Island, for the 1973 season, at a rate of \$190.85 per week. Said Contract Agreement was then executed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners.

At this point, a conference was held with Mr. Donald K. Simpson, Technical Manager of the Boston Transportation Planning Review, who presented to the Commission the matter of the Northwest Corridor impact on the M.D.C. in the Alewife Brook Area. Mr. Simpson presented the entire project by the use of slides, covering the detail of construction and proposed land taking. On completion of his presentation, Mr. Simpson requested that the Commission make a statement by May 16, 1973 to Alan Altshuler, Secretary of Transportation and Construction, on its preferences of the various options presented in the proposed project.

- 1 Report, April 27, on bids for installation of a Pearth Gas Recirculation System, Nut Island Sewage Treatment Plant, Quincy, Massachusetts, Sewerage Division Contract No. 263-S. The Commission V O T E D to accept the only bid received, that of Henry B. Byors & Sons, Inc., of \$11,570.00.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to the Water Division:

- 2 Proposal to acquire all, or part, of the property of Joseph and Matilda Truman, and the property of Charles F. Frost, in the Prescott Peninsula area of the Quabbin Reservoir; also reports of Mr. Grigalus, March 28 and April 3. The Commission V O T E D to approve the recommendation of Associate Commissioner Lyman to acquire the Whitney and Frost properties, as shown on plan submitted.

- 3 Matter of Chicopee Aqueduct; also report of Mr. Wright, April 30. The Commission V O T E D to authorize the Commissioner and the Chief Water Supply Engineer to negotiate with officials of the City of Chicopee and Westover Air Base relative to conditions contained in the existing agreement. The Commission further V O T E D to authorize the Water Division to clean the interior of the Aqueduct using funds from the maintenance account.

- 4 Letter of Robert K. - 5 Report, May 1, on bids for retubing Boiler No. 32 at Chestnut Hill Pumping Station in Boston, Contract No. 315-W. The Commission V O T E D to accept the lowest bid, that of Atlas Boiler Works, Inc., of \$34,990.00.

- 6 Matter of condition of the "Old Stone Church" structure, West Boylston. The Commission V O T E D to authorize the Commissioner and Mr. Matera to discuss the problem with Town officials, Historical Society, and nearby residents, if possible, regarding what steps should be taken by the M.D.C. to insure the safety of the structure.

- 9 Report, May 1, on bids for core borings for the Charles River Estuary, Storm Detention and Chlorination Station and Appurtenant Conduit Lines, Cambridge and Boston, Contract No. E-426. The Commission V O T E D to accept the lowest bid, that of B & J Drilling, of \$45,435.00.

The Commission V O T E D: Approved, with the proviso that the area will be sodded and that hand digging will be done near all trees.
 - 5 Report, April 25, on sub-bids on Section 9B (Lathing & Plastering), Contract No. 2264, for repairs and improvements at the Hatch Memorial Shell, Storrow Drive, Boston. The Commission V O T E D to accept the lowest sub-bid, that of Gittel & Flanagan, Inc., of \$1,475.00. The Commission further V O T E D to approve Alteration Order No. 1, to indicate a credit to the Commission in the sum of \$1325.00, as an adjustment to the contract.
 - 6 Request, April 23, for preliminary approval of replacing basketball courts at Foss Park with 2 new tennis courts and a single basketball court, a half court with benches and landscaping, improved drainage, lighting modernization, etc. Est. cost=\$37,500.00. The Commission V O T E D: Approved.

 - 10 Report, April 30, on request of Farwell Construction Corporation for an extension of time from April 30, 1973 to July 27, 1973, on Contract No. 2175, for construction of Ice Skating Rink, Lynn. The Commission V O T E D to approve an extension of time to July 27, 1973, to be effective, however, only upon receipt of the written consent of the bonding company.
 - 11 Report, April 30, on request of Allied Weatherproofing Company for an extension of time from May 15, 1973 to July 6, 1973, on Contract No. 2264, for repairs and improvements at the Hatch Memorial Shell. The Commission V O T E D: Denied.
 - 12 Report, April 30, on sub-bids for Section 7A - Roofing, Flashing, and Sheet Metal Work, on Contract No. 2234, for construction of Boat House, Mystic River Reservation, Somerville (General Contractor - Rich Construction Company). The Commission V O T E D to reject the only sub-bid received, as recommended. The Commission further V O T E D to authorize the solicitation of new bids.



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- 1 Report, April 30, recommending that the Commission approve Alteration No. 4, in the amount of \$463.43, on Contract No. 2180, with South Shore Paving Company, for site work and site development at the Aviary, Franklin Park Zoo, Dorchester. The Commission V O T E D: Approved.
 - 2 Report, April 30, recommending that the Commission approve Extra Work Order No. 1 in the amount of \$25,350.00, on Contract No. 2221, with M. Solimando, Inc., for refurbishing Bird House, Franklin Park Zoo, Dorchester. The Commission V O T E D: Approved. The Commission further V O T E D: Mr. Condon to review the architectural performance of Geometrics, Inc. with M.D.C. to date, and report findings to the Commission.
 - 3 Report, April 26, recommending that the Commission vote to confirm their action (voted April 25, 1973) relative to Extra Work Order No. 1, in the amount of \$1,795.00, on Contract No. 2209, with D. J. McCarty Construction Co., for alterations to Police and Comfort Station Buildings, Commonwealth Avenue, Auburndale. The Commission V O T E D to confirm its action of April 25, 1973 on this matter, as recommended.
 - 4 Report, April 25, requesting permission to post bids for proposed gore protection at Neponset Bridge, Quincy. Est. cost = \$4125.00. The Commission V O T E D: Approved.
- Action was taken upon the following matters relating to Parks and Recreation Division:
- 5 Report of Messrs. Kenney and Whalen, April 10, requesting permission to grant special reduced swimming pool rates to non-profit and charitable organizations. The Commission V O T E D: Held over.

 - 13 Request of Town of Milton, Police Department, for a three year renewal of contract between the M.D.C. and the Town for concurrent jurisdiction on certain streets in Milton under Commission control. The Commission V O T E D to renew the contract agreement for one year only, commencing July 1, 1973 and ending June 30, 1974, unless sooner terminated in accordance with the provisions of said contract.

ORDER OF TAKING
 COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS
 METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION

Boston, May 2, 1973.

ORDERED: That the Metropolitan District Commission acting herein by virtue of the authority conferred upon the Metropolitan District Water Supply Commission by Chapter 705 of the Acts of the year 1945 and acts in amendment thereof or in addition thereto, which authority was vested in the Metropolitan District Commission by Chapter 583 of the Acts of 1947, and every other power and authority hereto enabling, for the purposes of said Acts, does hereby order the taking of and does hereby take the right and easement to occupy and use for the passage of men and vehicles, the transportation of machinery and materials and for depositing machinery, tools, dirt and other materials thereon, together with the right to remove said machinery, tools, dirt and other materials so deposited thereon, and the right to excavate soil, rock and other materials together with the right to replace said soil, rock and other materials, and also the right to locate and relocate thereon electric utility and telephone poles, transmission lines, wires and appurtenances, together with the right to remove therefrom said electric utility and telephone poles, transmission lines, wires and appurtenances, but in no event later than June 30, 1975, the following described parcels of land situated in Cambridge in the County of Middlesex and Commonwealth of Massachusetts, shown on a plan entitled "Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Metr. Distr. Commission - Construction Division, Metropolitan Sewerage District, North Charles Relief Sewer, Land Taking Plan No. N.C.R.S.-18 * * * March 1, 1973," being plan accession no. 62019, a copy of which shall be recorded with a copy of this order in the Middlesex South District Registry of Deeds and made a part of this order, namely:

Parcel One:

Beginning at a point in the southeasterly corner of a Commonwealth of Massachusetts (M.D.C.) temporary easement shown as Parcel L, which point is distant south 52° 34' 00" west, thirty and 0/10 (30.0) feet from the southeasterly side line of Waverly Street (private and public) as shown on the aforesaid plan;

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

1776

We the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, do hereby declare that these United States are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connections between them and that Crown are hereby totally dissolved.

That the Colonies have the Right to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, enter into Combinations, engage in Wars, and do all other Things which independent States may lawfully do; and that the Colonies are entitled to the same Rights and Liberties as the most civilized Nations of the World.

WHEREAS: Captain Murphy faithfully discharged his normal duties with



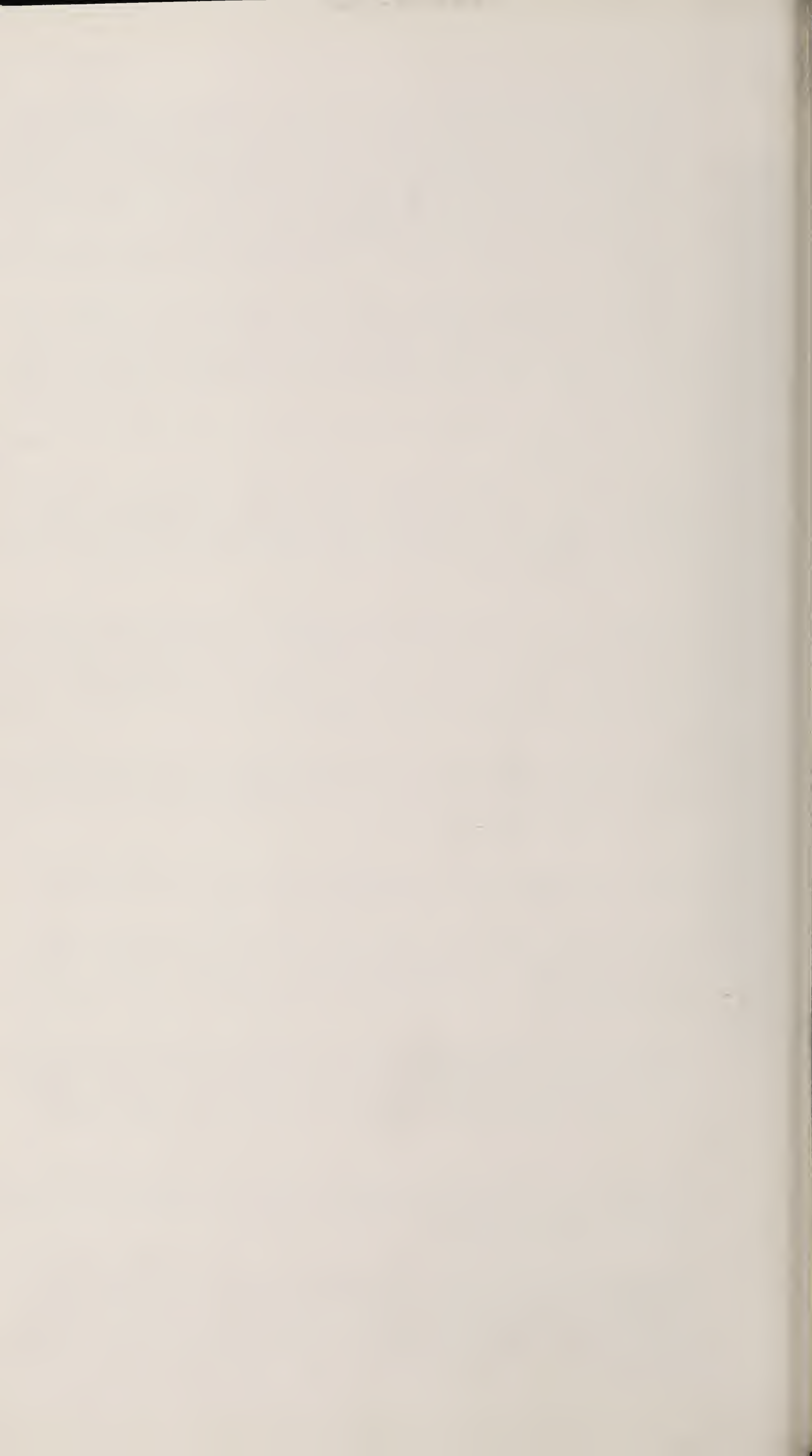

Greenough Boulevard, Cambridge; Charles River, Cambridge and Boston; and Soldiers Field Road, Boston (Brighton District), a distance of approximately 9960 feet, for the transmission of electricity, said location being under the care and control of this Commission, and found by order of the Department of Public Utilities to be required by public convenience and necessity, said plans and petition being on file in the office of the Commission, a hearing on said petition having been given by this Commission on Wednesday, October 17, 1973, at 9:55 A.M., at the office of the Commission in Boston, of which hearing due notice was given to all persons interested of the time and place by publishing a copy of said petition and the order of notice issued thereon by this Commission in newspapers published in the Cities of Boston, Cambridge and Somerville, and the Town of Arlington, being the cities and town in which the location petitioned for would lie, the first publication having been made at least fourteen days prior to the date of said hearing, and it appearing, in the opinion of this Commission, that public convenience and necessity so require, said Boston Edison Company is hereby granted a location for said manholes, test stations and steel pipes, with the necessary wires, cables, and related apparatus therein, in said McGrath Highway, Alewife Brook Parkway,



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Concord Avenue, Fresh Pond Parkway, Charles W. Greenough Boulevard, Charles River, and Soldiers Field Road, to the extent and upon the terms, conditions and obligations hereinafter specified, the same being such as the public necessity and a due regard for the rights of the Commonwealth require, namely:

1. The Boston Edison Company shall conform to all provisions of law applicable to the exercise of the rights and performance of the work under this grant and to the rules and regulations of the Metropolitan District Commission.
2. The Boston Edison Company shall do the work of installing said manholes, test stations and steel pipes, with the necessary wires, cables, and related apparatus therein, in the location hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner and location, and in all other respects.
3. Said Boston Edison Company shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company of the rights hereby granted or by reason of any negligence of said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.
4. Said Boston Edison Company shall protect and maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was as the time of this grant and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condition to the satisfaction of said Director.
5. This location is granted by the Metropolitan District Commission subject to conditions outlined in report of Martin F. Cosgrove, Administrative Engineer, dated October 17, 1973 (copy attached), and the conditions set forth in letter of Boston Conservation Commission, dated July 10, 1973, being their file 6-15 (copy attached).
6. If any future needs of the Metropolitan District Commission require the relocation of any portion of this transmission line, such relocation will be done by the Boston Edison Company or its successor without expense to the Metropolitan District Commission, and that the Commission shall in no way be liable for any damage to any structure or work authorized herein which may be caused by or result from future operations undertaken by the Commission.

The Boston Edison Company shall place and maintain proper barriers at all times and from the beginning of twilight through the whole of every night sufficient lights to protect the public from injury or damage during the progress of the work under this grant or during repairs upon said manholes, test stations and steel pipes, with the necessary wires, cables, and related apparatus therein, and work on the location which may hereafter become necessary.

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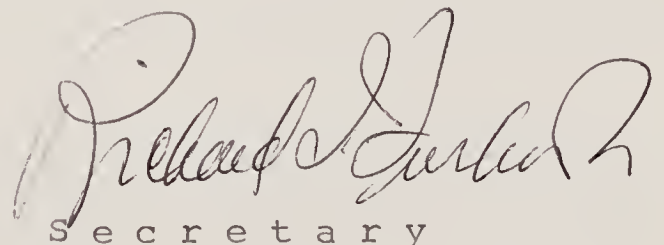

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

1. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall conform to all provisions of law applicable to the exercise of the rights and performance of the work under this grant and to the rules and regulations of the Metropolitan District Commission.
2. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall do the work of installing said conduit, cable, and manhole, in the location

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hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner, and location and in all other respects.

3. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.

4. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall protect and maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was at the time of this grant, and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condition to the satisfaction of said Director.

Record of the Two Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-First (2821st) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, January 16, 1974, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and three Associate Commissioners:

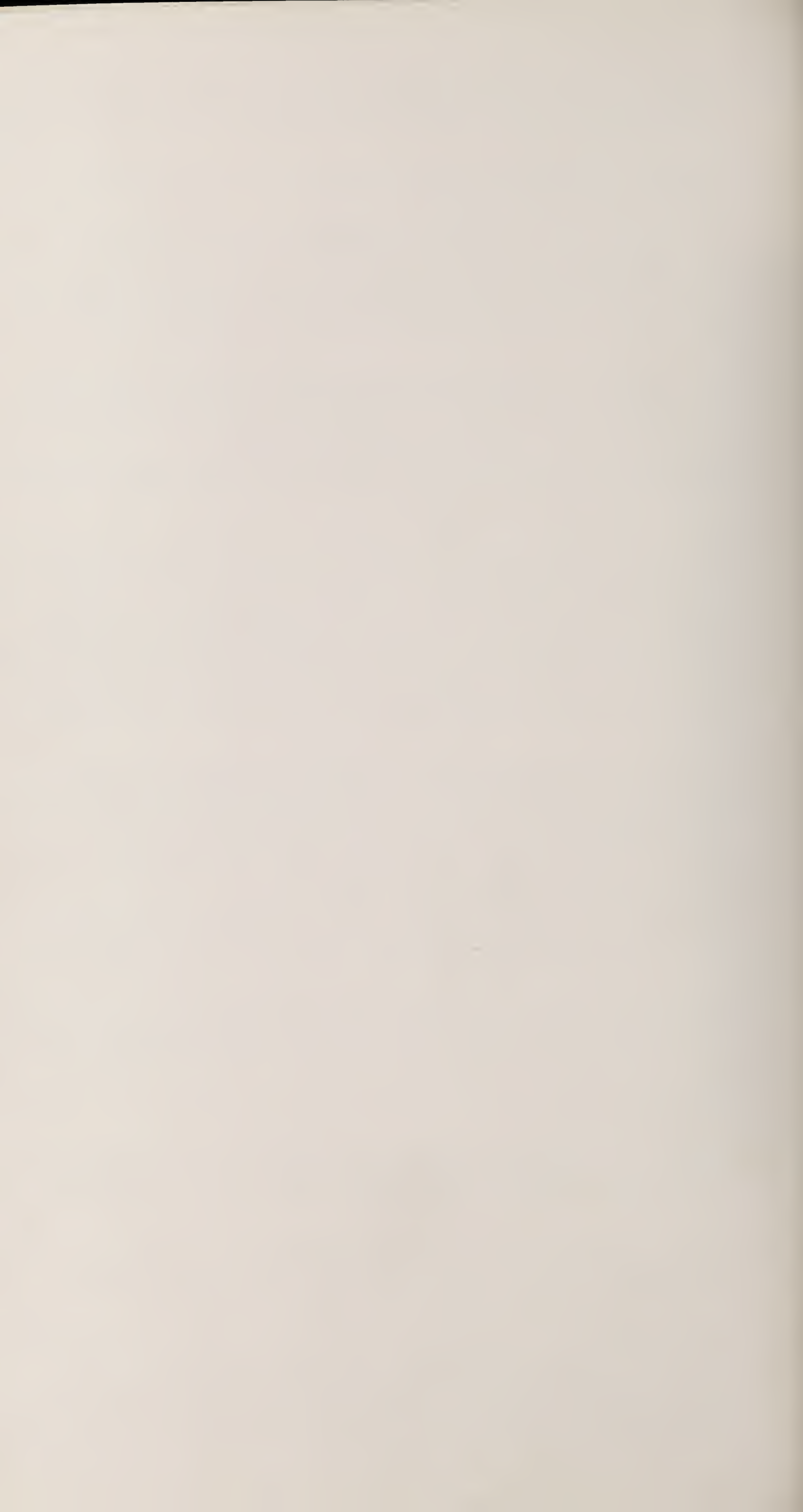

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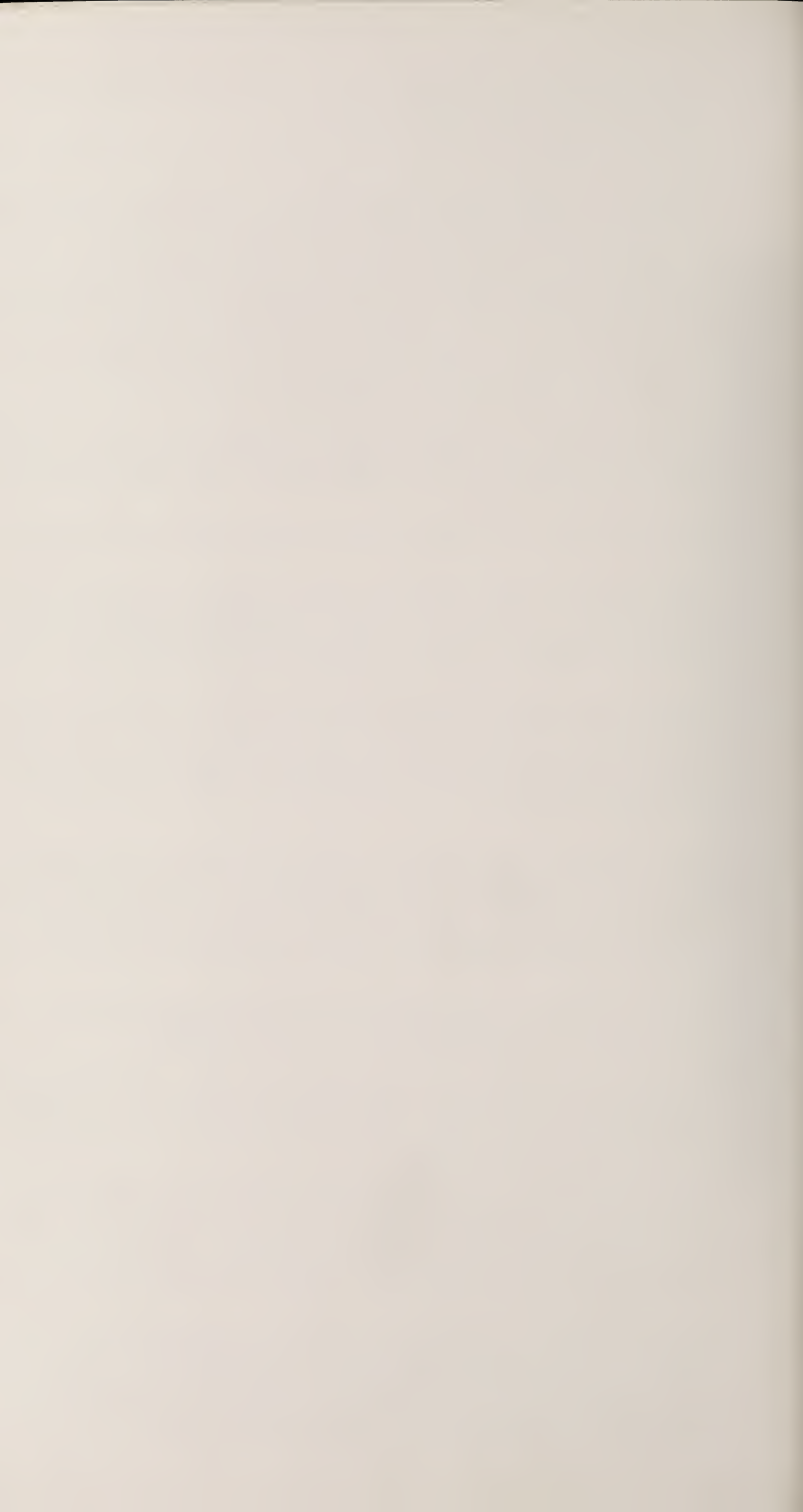

ORDERED that, on petition of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated December 19, 1973, for location shown on plans of New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated July 6, 1973, and indexed accession numbers 48588X, 48589X, 48590X, 48591X, and 48592X, for approximately 2,459 lineal feet of underground conduit and cable therein, and 4 manholes, in Winthrop Avenue, Revere, northeasterly side, southwesterly from beginning of Metropolitan District Commission jurisdiction extending into the northeasterly side of Revere Beach Parkway, thence southeasterly to point shown as A, to be used for the transmission of intelligence by electricity, said location being under the care and control of this Commission, and found by order of the Department of Public Utilities to be required by public convenience and necessity, said plans and petition being on file in the office of the Commission, a hearing on said petition having been given by this Commission on Wednesday, January 23, 1974, at 9:55 A.M., at the office of the Commission in Boston, of which hearing due notice was given to all persons interested of the time and place by publishing a copy of said petition and the order of notice issued thereon by this Commission in newspapers published in the City of Revere, being the city in which the location petitioned for would lie, the first publication having been made at least fourteen days prior to the date of said hearing, and it appearing, in the opinion of this Commission, that public convenience and necessity so require, said New England Telephone and Telegraph Company is hereby granted a location for said underground conduit and cable therein, and 4 manholes, in said Winthrop Avenue, to the extent and upon the terms, conditions, and obligations hereinafter specified, the same being such as the public necessity and a due regard for the rights of the Commonwealth require, namely:-

1. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall conform to



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all provisions of law applicable to the exercise of the rights and performance of the work under this grant and to the rules and regulations of the Metropolitan District Commission.

2. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall do the work of installing said conduit, cable, and manholes, in the location hereby granted subject to the approval of the Director of Park Engineering of the Commission as to time, manner and location, and in all other respects.

3. The New England Telephone and Telegraph shall indemnify and save harmless the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Metropolitan District Commission from any damage it or they may sustain or be required to pay arising out of the exercise by said Company or any of its employees in connection with the work done hereunder.

4. The New England Telephone and Telegraph Company shall protect and maintain all trees, drainage or water pipes, and all appurtenances or structures either above or below the surface of the ground over which this location lies, and upon completion of the work shall restore the surface of the ground to the condition in which it was at the time of this grant, and in a manner satisfactory to said Director of Park Engineering of the Commission, and shall maintain the surface of the ground and the location throughout in such condition to the satisfaction of said Director.

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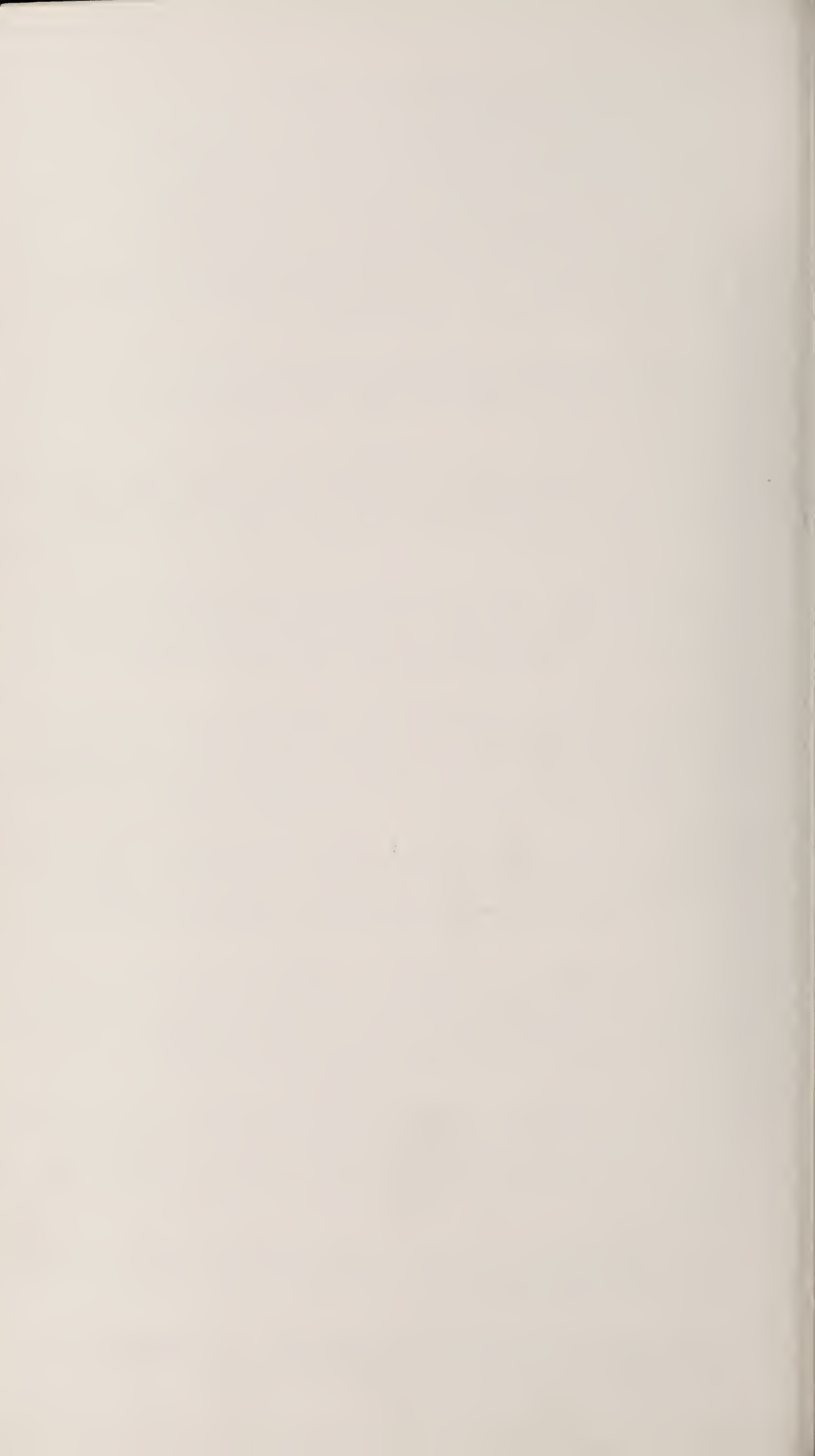

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Record of the Two Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-Fourth (2824th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, February 6, 1974, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien, Lyman and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following Agreement which was executed by the Commissioner and four Associate Commissioners:

1 Agreement, for the calendar year 1972, between the City of Boston and the Metropolitan District Commission, to reimburse the City, in the amount of \$30,602.29, for use by the Commonwealth of the Boston sewers and sewerage works for certain portions of the Neponset sewerage system (Dorchester and Milton), and the Squantum section of Quincy.

2 At this point, the Commission took up the matter of the application of the Museum of Science for a Club Liquor License. Commissioner Sears reported on the negotiations between Mr. Wright, representing the Commission, and Mr. Harold Hestness, Esq. of Hale and Dorr, representing the Museum, concerning terms of the Museum's lease. After a thorough discussion, the Commission V O T E D to authorize the Commissioner to communicate to the Boston Licensing Board the sentiments of the Commission, to wit:

1. The Commission does not object to the consumption of alcohol, at the Museum, by members thereof, or by their guests;
2. The Commission does not object to the sale of alcohol, at the Museum, to members thereof and their guests; and the Commission is willing to renegotiate its lease with the Museum with respect to hours, locations, and other appropriate matters;
3. The Commission does strenuously object to inspections of the Museum by the Boston or Cambridge Police Departments in connection with the dispensation of alcohol, and the Commission requires that enforcement activities within Science Park be carried out in company with, and in the presence of, the Metropolitan Police; and the Commission directs the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police to make such inspections as may be required, and to respond promptly to any request made by the Boston Licensing Board to enforce any regulations which it may impose within the Museum.
4. In this context, the Commission does not support, nor does it oppose, the granting of a Club Liquor License to the Museum of Science.

3 A conference was held with representatives of Process Research, Inc., Consultants for the Commission, in connection with the project of controlling pollution of the waters in the Storrow Lagoon. Commissioner Sears opened the conference by welcoming the representatives of Process Research, Inc.

Dr. J. Douglas Smith then made a presentation concerning the investigation of Process Research, Inc. into the present condition of the Charles River Basin and parts of Boston Harbor, various alternative water quality improvement strategies, and specifically on the pilot in-stream treatment project at Storrow Lagoon. The results achieved at the Lagoon project to date appear inconclusive for several reasons, including the installation of the operation in the late spring, and the differences in flow characteristics between the small Lagoon project and a full-scale river treatment plant. After the presentation, the Commissioners probed Dr. Smith and his associates concerning various aspects of the in-stream treatment process, especially annual operation costs. The Commission took the matter under advisement, and the conference concluded at 12:40 P.M.

4 At this point, a conference was held with representatives of the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority relative to their request for reduction of parking fees at the Commission's Ocean Avenue, Revere, facilities. Mr. Donald Graham explained that the M.B.T.A. will be resurfacing its parking lot during the spring and summer and would like to reach agreement with the Commission as to how the overflow will be handled. He specifically proposed that the M.B.T.A. take over the management of all parking lots at the Revere location, including those of the Commission, so that fares could be uniformly altered in pursuit of a "filled lot" policy. A discussion followed in which the specific proposal was discussed, as well as matters of common interest at other locations, such as Riverside. The Commission took the Revere proposal under advisement.

 BE IT RESOLVED: That the Metropolitan District Commission, assembled in its Meeting held on February 6, 1974, does hereby express its deep and sincere appreciation to Albert J. LePage for his many years of uninterrupted service, and for the outstanding example he has set as a state employee; that the Commissioner and Associate Commissioners constituting said Metropolitan District Commission do hereby extend to him their cordial best wishes that the years of his retirement may be many, and that they may be fruitful in the happiness and contentment he so richly deserves; that this Resolution be spread upon the records of this Meeting; and that the Secretary prepare and forward a suitably inscribed copy to Mr. LePage.

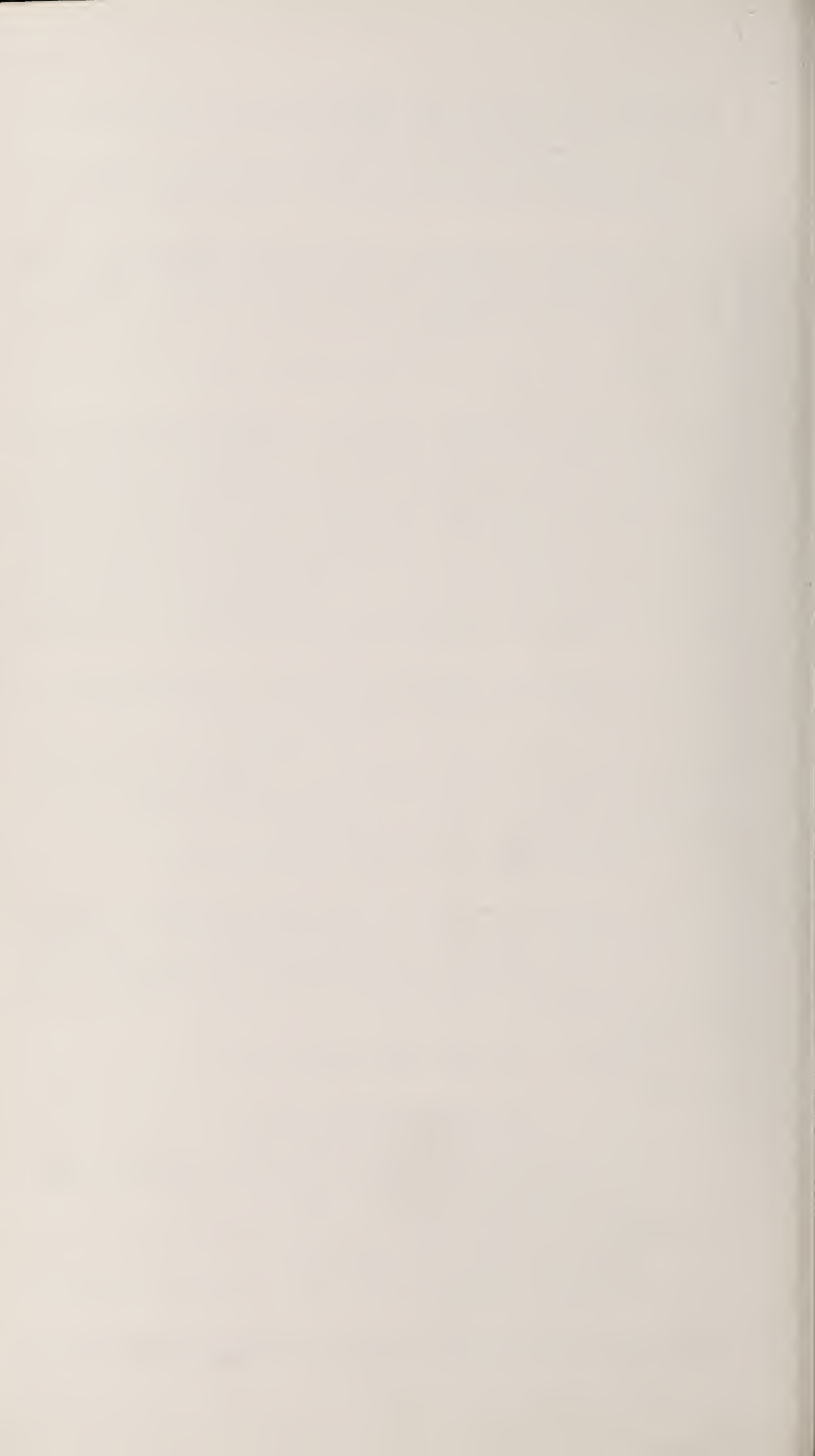

Record of the Two Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty-Fifth (2825th) Meeting of the Metropolitan District Commission duly called and held at 20 Somerset Street, Boston, Massachusetts, on Wednesday, February 13, 1974, at 10:00 A.M.

Present, Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners Haggerty, O'Brien and Cronin.

The records of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

The Secretary submitted for signature the following papers which were signed by the Commissioner and three Associate Commissioners:

- 8 Contract No. 320-W, with The New England Pipe Cleaning Co., for cleaning cast-iron sewer mains in Rutland and Holden.

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1 Consultant Agreement with C E Maguire, Inc., for services in connection with development of an efficient water resources management plan to determine future use of existing resources in Upper Sudbury River Watershed.

2 Contract No. E-427, with Peabody Petersen N.E., Inc., for the construction of Mystic River Basin Elevation Control Project Pumping Station, Everett.

3 Contract between the Massachusetts Department of Public Works and the Metropolitan District Commission (as revised by the Mass. Dept. of Public Works), re: construction of seawall, channelization and signalization of Quincy Shore Drive, Improvements to Caddy Park and Ruff's Hummock, Wollaston Beach.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to the Water Division:

4 Report, February 5, on request of the City of Somerville for approval to change the rates charged for water supplied to consumers. The Commission discussed at length the advisability of continuing to allow quantity discount rates for water, a practice which seems likely to encourage greater consumption, if not excessive use, of water. Members of the Commission agreed that water conservation is the responsibility of the Commission and is one of its goals. However, in view of the immediate need for clarification posed by the adoption of the new water rate, the Commission V O T E D to approve the minimum rate of \$9.60 per semi-annum for 2,000 cubic feet insofar as the Commission is authorized to do so under Section 27 of Chapter 92 of the General Laws, effective February 1, 1974, subject to further deliberation of the Commission and the member communities of the Water District, in an effort to discourage excessive quantity discounts which may cause careless consumption of water.

5 At this point, the Commission took up the matter of revised water rate charges for several communities receiving water from the Metropolitan District Commission's water system, but not members of the Water District (in further reference to report of Mr. Grieve dated January 28, 1974). Following a discussion of the matter, the Commission took the following action:

Leominster

The Commission V O T E D: Held over for discussions with local officials by Mr. Grieve, Mr. Matera, and Mr. O'Donnell.

Westborough State Hospital

The Commission V O T E D to approve the recommendation of Mr. Grieve to adjust the water rate from \$30.00 to \$50.00 per million gallons, effective January 1, 1974.

Clinton

The Commission V O T E D to approve the recommendation of Mr. Grieve to adjust the water rate from \$30.00 to \$50.00 per million gallons, effective January 1, 1974.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to the Engineering Division:

6 Report of Mr. Cosgrove, January 15, submitting request of Process Research Inc. for an increase in the upset price for contract services performed in 1973 on the Storrow Lagoon Project; also submitting proposal for the continuation of the project for the 1974 season. Also reports of Mr. Polgar, February 4, and Mr. Wright, February 12. The Commission discussed at length the recommendation of Mr. Cosgrove that the existing contract with Process Research Inc. for the Storrow Lagoon Project be revised by extending the operation through the spring, summer and fall of 1974, increasing the upset price to \$465,369.43. Mr. Wright has reviewed the administration of the contract with Process Research Inc. to date, and he recommended to the Commission that further analysis of past performance be undertaken before the Commission entertains any extension of the existing contract. The members of the Commission agreed that it was the responsibility of the Commission to pursue potentially productive technology for water quality improvement, but only within the bounds of fiscal responsibility to the member communities. The Commission, therefore, V O T E D to direct its Administrative Engineer, Mr. Cosgrove, to further analyze the technical performance and contract administration of Process Research Inc. to

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date, and to report to the Commission at its next meeting on February 27, 1974, the outcome of his investigation and recommend to the Commission whether, and on what basis, further work should be performed by Process Research Inc.

- 1 Report, February 5, on bids for the purchase of approximately 7,000 cubic yards of surplus tunnel spoil, Contract No. E-442. The Commission V O T E D to accept the highest bid, that of Solimando Construction Co., Inc., of \$1,470.00.

- 2 At this point, the Commission took up the matter of bid openings by the Army Corps of Engineers for the Charles River Dam. The Commission was informed by letter of February 13, 1974, from Colonel Charles J. Osterndorf, that construction bids were opened on February 7, 1974, and that the apparent low bid was received from J. F. White Contracting Company, Newton, Massachusetts, in the amount of \$34,957,250.00. Analysis of the low bid indicates that it will be necessary for the Commission to make an additional funding commitment to the Federal Government over and above the \$5,545,000.00 state funds obligated for project costs. The additional required funding is \$255,000.00 for a total (non-federal) Commission contribution to project costs of \$5,800,000.00. This cost does not include the proposed highway bridge over the project, which is still under study, and the cost of which will be borne by the Commission at such time as the roadway is built. After a lengthy discussion, the Commission acted upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Francis T. Bergin, and V O T E D to rescind the vote of November 7, 1973, approving Commission funding of an amount not to exceed \$650,000.00 as the Commission share for the incorporation of the M.D.C. Police Patrol Facility into the Charles River Dam Project.
 The Commission further V O T E D to approve funding for the Commission share of the incorporation of the M.D.C. Police Patrol Facility into the Charles River Dam Project in an amount consistent with the bids received by the Army Corps of Engineers. 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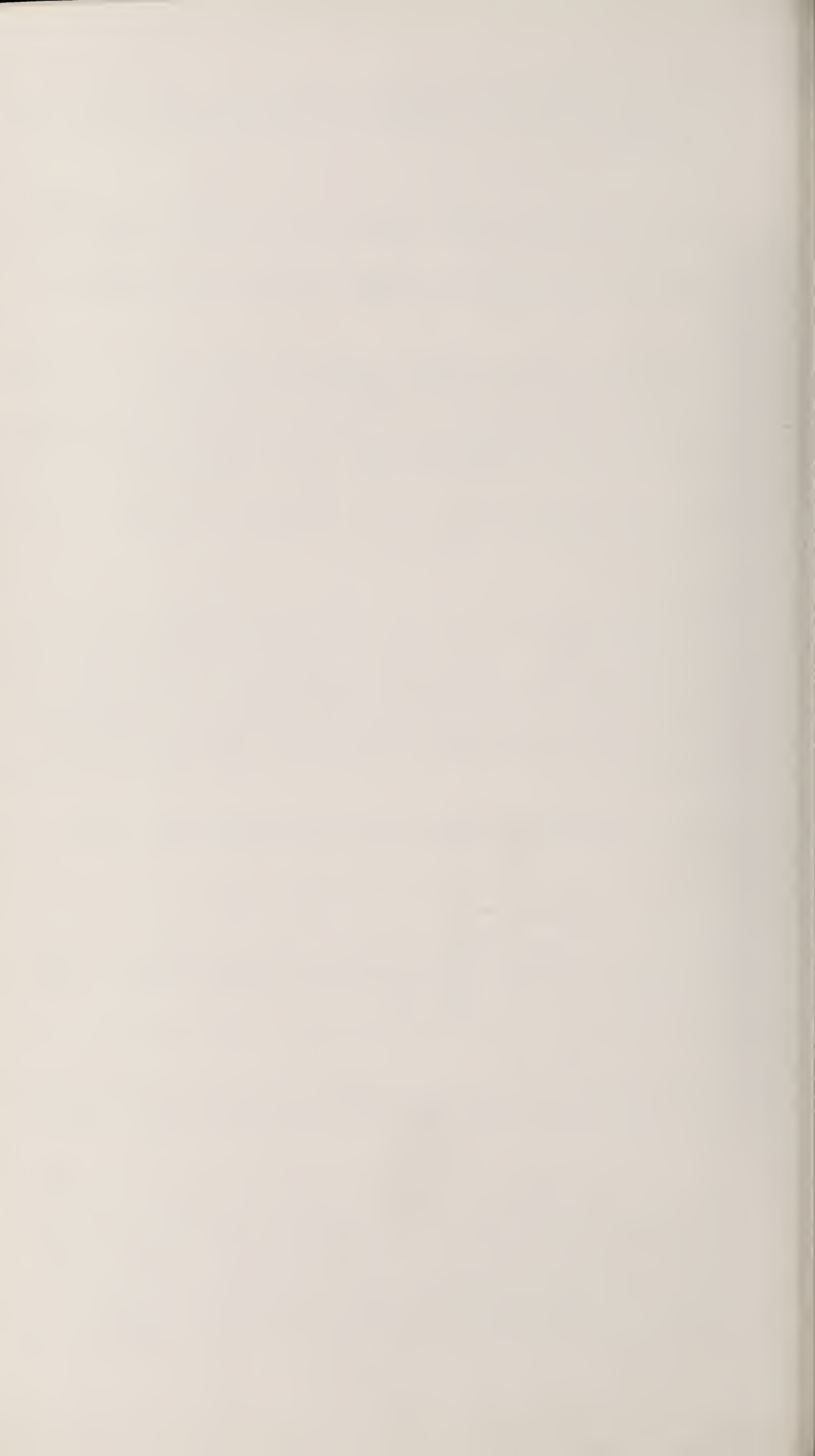

WHEREAS: Mr. Furbush on January 2, 1957, was elected unanimously by the members of the Metropolitan District Commission to be their Secretary, and rendered notable service for 17 years as Secretary under five Commissioners during which he was a guiding influence on the policies, functions, and operations of the Commission; and while his official responsibilities claimed his wholehearted interest and support, he was always a loyal friend to his fellow employees; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Metropolitan District Commission assembled in its meeting held on February 27, 1974, does hereby express its deep and sincere appreciation and thanks to Richard I. Furbush for the devoted and perceptive attention he has always given his duties, and for the example he has set as an outstanding Secretary, a highly competent administrator, and a conscientious and dedicated public servant; that the Commissioner and Associate Commissioners constituting said Metropolitan District Commission do hereby extend to him their personal wishes that the years of his retirement may be many, and that they may be fruitful in the happiness and contentment he so richly deserves; that this Resolution be spread upon the records of this meeting; and that the Secretary prepare and forward a suitably inscribed copy thereof to Mr. Furbush.

The planning study is presently 70% complete and is being done in conjunction with the New England Division, Army Corps of Engineers, who are evaluating the advisability of land disposal of wastewater.
 - 7 At this point, Mayor Arthur J. Clark, City of Waltham, appeared before the Commission to discuss proposed redevelopment plans on the banks of the Charles River at the Moody Street Dam in the City of Waltham. The members of the Commission expressed their sense that any building on the banks of the river be designed with an adequate height-setback ratio to avoid the domination of the river by the building. The Commissioners further expressed their sense that they would support restoration and appropriate landscaping of the river banks, but would oppose any substantial alteration of the course of the river. Commissioner Sears and Associate Commissioners O'Brien and Lyman expressed the sentiment that they would be willing to use the Commission's power of eminent domain to create a Metropolitan park on the banks of the Charles River in the vicinity of the Moody Street Dam in Waltham, if requested to do so by ordinance of the Waltham City Council and approved by the Mayor. The Commission then V O T E D to authorize the Commissioner to select an appraiser to appraise land and buildings on the banks of the river in Waltham owned by the Sterling Insulation Mfg. Co. and the American Publishing Company. Associate Commissioners Haggerty and Cronin voted No.

- 1 Report of Mr. Cosgrove, March 25, submitting proposal of Metcalf & Eddy, Inc., February 21, 1974, for engineering services in connection with the Boston Harbor - Eastern Massachusetts Wastewater Study - Industrial Waste Survey and Inventory, at a total cost of \$46,000.00. Mr. Cosgrove reported to the Commission on several discussions with the Corps of Engineers. The Commission then V O T E D to select Metcalf & Eddy, Inc. to perform engineering services for the Industrial Waste Survey and Inventory of the Boston Harbor - Eastern Massachusetts Wastewater Study, with the expectation that the cost will be reimbursed by the Corps of Engineers.
- 2 Report of Mr. Grigalus, April 10, submitting for Commission acceptance Temporary Right and Easement of a parcel of Monsanto Company's land in Everett for use in connection with construction of the Pumping Station, Mystic River Basin Elevation Control Project; also report of Mr. Weiss, April 22. The Commission V O T E D to accept the Temporary Right and Easement as submitted, and to authorize the Commissioner to sign same for and on behalf of the Commission.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to the Parks Engineering Division:

- 3 At this point, the Commission discussed the proposed closing of the Overpass at the Cambridge end of the Boston University Bridge for the dedication of the overpass as the WILLIAM J. REID MEMORIAL OVERPASS on Sunday, May 12, 1974. The Commission V O T E D to close the overpass to traffic for the 3:00 P.M. ceremony, and directed the Superintendent of Police to make appropriate arrangements for traffic diversion.
- 4 Report of Mr. Condon, April 29, on bid for Swimming Pool Restoration, Magazine Beach, Cambridge, Contract No. 2367; also report of Mr. Cosgrove - 4/29/74. After a thorough discussion of the available alternatives, the Commission V O T E D to reject the only bid received, that of Salem Engineering & Const. Corp., on the basis that it was substantially in excess of the engineer's estimate. The Commission further V O T E D to direct the Director of Park Engineering to prepare plans and specifications for a contract for the repair of filtration systems, plumbing, and other necessary mechanical repairs at the Magazine Beach Pool as expeditiously as possible.
- 5 Report of Mr. Condon, April 29, regarding failure of S. Richards Construction Co., Inc. to execute Contract No. 2353-I, for 5,000 gallon gasoline tank and pump at the Old Colony Police Station, South Boston, and recommending that their bid security be forfeited; also requesting permission to re-solicit bids for the work. The Commission V O T E D to accept the recommendation of Mr. Condon that, since S. Richards Construction Co., Inc. failed to execute Contract No. 2353-I, their bid security be forfeited. The Commission further V O T E D: Permission granted to re-solicit bids for the work.
- 6 Report of Mr. Condon, April 17, requesting authority to advertise a contract for resurfacing and reconstruction of roadways, sidewalks and drainage in Neponset and Harbor Districts. Est. cost = \$500,000. The Commission V O T E D: Held over.
- 7 Report of Mr. Cosgrove, May 3, 1974, submitting draft of agreement with Symmes, Maini & McKee, Inc. for consultant services in connection with development of the Riverside Park Recreational Facility, Weston, Project Area 1, at a fee of \$100,000.00; also recommending that the General Counsel be authorized to prepare final Agreement. The Commission V O T E D to approve the draft of agreement with Symmes, Maini & McKee, Inc. as submitted at a fee of \$100,000.00. The Commission further V O T E D to direct the General Counsel to prepare the agreement in final form.
- 8 Report of Mr. Cosgrove, May 6, submitting preliminary draft of agreement with Bayside Engineering Associates, Inc. for consultant services for the Sports Arena and Recreational Facility, Dorchester (John A.



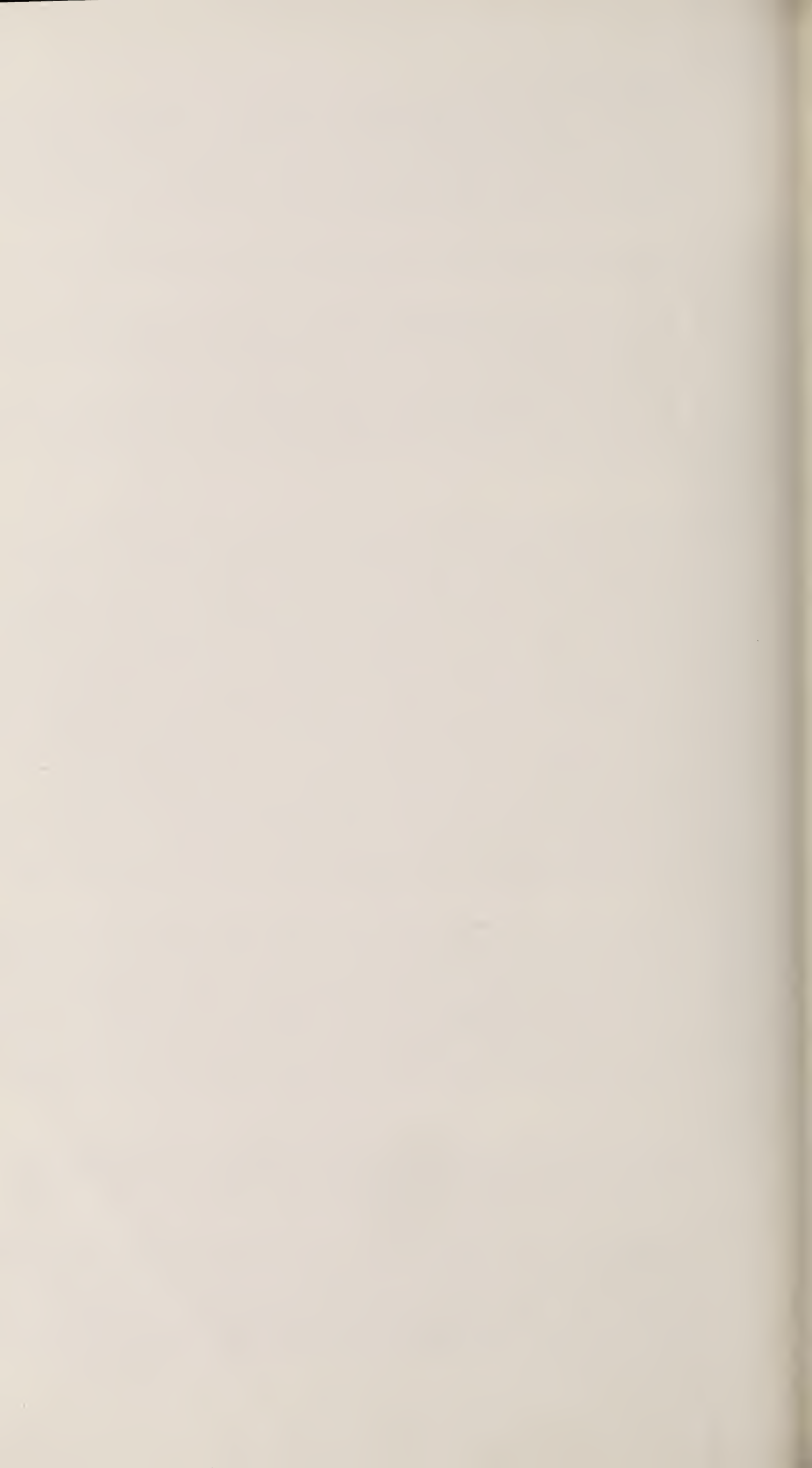
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Ryder Sports Arena).

The Commission discussed the advisability of including items in the draft agreement with Bayside Engineering Associates, Inc. for Master Plan, Surveys and Environmental Studies. After a thorough discussion, the Commission V O T E D to approve the draft proposal, with the exception of items for Master Plan, Surveys, and Environmental Studies. The Commission further V O T E D to direct the General Counsel to prepare an agreement in final form.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to the Parks Division:

- 1 Letter of Boston Zoological Society, March 26, recommending transfer of management of the Trailside Museum to the Massachusetts Audubon Society, effective July 1, 1974; also proposal from the Massachusetts Audubon Society.
 The Commission discussed the program proposal submitted by the Massachusetts Audubon Society. The Commission V O T E D to approve the program proposal but, in addition, the Commission hoped more emphasis would be placed on the environmental education and activities for children.
- 2 Reports of Mr. Williams, April 12 and April 30, relative to proposal of By-Word Corporation to provide management services at Bunker Hill, Fort Warren and Fort Independence; also letters of Mr. Klemmer of By-Word Corporation, April 27 and May 7, and Mr. Wright, May 8. The Commission discussed Mr. Klemmer's proposal that the reduced fee schedule for visitors at Bunker Hill of 50¢ for adults, 35¢ for children, and 25¢ for members of groups, be subject to an experiment for the month of May. The Commission felt that the single month of May would not provide a trial period of long enough duration. The Commission, therefore, V O T E D to amend the provisions of the By-Word Corporation contract to provide for an experimental period consisting of the months of May and June, at the fee schedule of 50¢ for adults, 35¢ for children, and 25¢ for members of groups, and to re-evaluate the fee situation at the end of that time. The Commission further V O T E D to suspend its 10¢ admission charge to the Monument and Museum, and require that all visitors pay the By-Word Corporation fee for the interpretive program as a condition of entrance to the Monument. The Commission further V O T E D that there shall be no guarantee or agreement that the Commission will pay the difference to the By-Word Corporation in the event that gross revenues fall below \$48,000.00.
- 3 Report of Mr. Williams, April 26, submitting proposal of Bay State-Spray & Provincetown Steamship Co. for exclusive right to use MDC docks and floats for the purposes of the Charles River excursion and shuttle service, for the 1974 season. The Commission V O T E D to approve the proposal of Bay State-Spray & Provincetown Steamship Co. for exclusive right to use MDC docks and floats for the purposes of the Charles River excursion and shuttle service, for the 1974 season, at an annual fee of \$100.00, with fares of \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children, and group rates and discount coupons available.
- 4 Report of Mr. Williams, April 29, on request of the Needham Park and Recreation Commission to establish a "Victory Garden" at Kennedy Farm to be maintained by the Needham Retired Men's Club. The Commission V O T E D: Approved as requested.
- 5 Report of Mr. McLaughlin, April 30, requesting approval of proposal to illuminate the Fishing Pier, Lynn, and 880 Lynnway, by the Massachusetts Electric Company; also report of Mr. Williams, May 6. The Commission V O T E D to approve the proposal at a cost of \$210.00 for the Bait Shop, and \$400.00 for extension to the vicinity of the Fishing Pier. The Commission further V O T E D to request a proposal from the Park Director on the exterior treatment proposed for the Bait Shop.



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- 1 Request of Mr. Cook for authorization to the Commissioner, or his designee, to carry out the provisions of Section 53, Chapter 92, G.L., as amended, and to execute such concert documents as may be necessary for the fiscal year 1974-1975. The Commission V O T E D: Approved.
- 2 Matter of awarding canteen concessions, for the 1974 summer season, at Sandy Beach, Winchester, and Breakheart Reservation, Saugus. The Commission V O T E D to award the canteen concession at Sandy Beach, Winchester, to John T. Reinold, d/b/a Do-Hut Time, Inc., for a fee of \$1100.00. The Commission further V O T E D to award the canteen concession at Breakheart Reservation, Saugus, to Marguerite Picillo for a fee of \$700.00.
- 3 Letter of Mrs. Edward C. Johnson, III, May 6, 1974, offering the Commission a gift of various trees and shrubs for Storrow Drive; also report of Mr. Falck, May 8. The Commission V O T E D to accept with thanks the gift of Mrs. Edward C. Johnson, III, of One Charles River Square, Boston, of various trees and shrubs to beautify the Storrow Drive in the area of Charles River Square.
- 4 Memorandum of Mr. Williams, May 7, relative to Senior Citizen Pool Fees. The Commission V O T E D to approve the recommendation of Mr. Williams to charge a fee of 10¢ per session for swimmers aged sixty-five and over, at the Commission's swimming pools.
- 5 Report of Mr. Falck, May 1974, requesting reconsideration of the Commission vote of April 24, 1974 relative to preliminary approval of improvements at Foss Park, Somerville (Engr. Order No. 30801). The Commission V O T E D to amend its vote of April 24, 1974 on this matter by striking out the condition that there will be no reduction in the space available for basketball.

Action was taken upon the following matter relating to Police:

- 6 Report of Mr. Cosgrove, May 3, recommending that all IDC bridges having a weight limit of less than 20 tons, be posted with signs showing the weight limit for the bridge; also report of Mr. Cosgrove, March 26.
 The Commission discussed the recommendation of Mr. Cosgrove that all IDC bridges which are deemed to be unsafe for a gross weight of less than 20 tons be posted with signs showing the weight limit, although the Commission recognized that all such bridges are on parkways which are restricted to weights less than 20 tons and that all legal requirements have already been met. It was the sense of the Commission that the interests of public safety would best be served by posting these additional bridges to take into consideration emergency situations where an individual bridge might be used by a vehicle heavier than the posted limit of the parkway.
 The Commission, therefore, V O T E D to direct the Park Director, Mr. Williams, to post all bridges presently unsafe for gross weights of less than 20 tons as determined by the Chief Parks Engineer, Mr. Condon, with signs showing the gross weight limit for the bridge.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to Legal-Right of Way - Driveways:

- 7 Report of Mr. Grigalus, April 23, submitting for approval offer of settlement of Boston and Maine Corporation, in the sum of \$30,000.00 for land taking, Charles River Dam; and recommending that the Commission amend its award of September 20, 1972 for said taking from \$22,650.00 to \$30,000.00. The Commission V O T E D to approve the sum of \$30,000.00 as full and final settlement for said taking. The Commission further V O T E D to amend its award of September 20, 1972 for said taking, from \$22,650.00 to \$30,000.00.
- 8 Matter of minority hiring, Franklin Park. The Commission V O T E D: Held over.
- 9 Report of Mr. Grigalus, April 30, relative to Boston & Maine Railroad

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use and occupancy of former Museum of Science land (Prison Point Bridge Project). The Commission V O T E D to direct Mr. Grigalus to contact the Boston & Maine Railroad and notify the Railroad of its trespass. The Commission further V O T E D to authorize the use of the land by the Boston & Maine Railroad from April 1st until such time as it is required by the Commission for construction purposes, at a monthly charge of \$3,000.00, on the basis of whatever conditions are deemed necessary by Mr. Grigalus and included by him in an appropriate instrument.

Action was taken upon the following matters relating to Planning:

1 Reports of George O'Malley, December 11, 1973 and March 25, 1974, relative to use of IDC Arts Building, Soldiers Field Road, Brighton; also presentation of Herter Park Master Plan by Mr. Falck of Planning; also proposal, March 6, 1974, of Mr. Robert Gordon of Polyarts, and reports of Mr. Falck, March 28, and Mr. Williams, April 30. At this point, Mr. Falck of the Planning Office made a presentation of the physical Master Plan for Herter Park, including the relocation and reduction of parking areas, a bicycle track and tennis courts. Mr. George O'Malley of the Park Division made a summary presentation of the programming proposals received to date, including those of: Three Boards And A Passion, Polyarts, Playwrights Platform, Publick Theater, and members of the Herter family. The Commission V O T E D to authorize the Park Director to develop a summer program incorporating the proposals of Playwrights Platform and Publick Theater. The Commission further V O T E D to grant preliminary approval of the exterior repairs and modifications of the I.C.A. Building, in the amount of \$30,000.00.

2 At this point, Mr. Robert Sloane, representing the Secretary of Transportation and Construction on matters regarding Bi-Centennial planning, appeared before the Commission to describe a concept of an Information Center at the I-95 Stub at Route 128 in Canton, with capacity for 180-350 vehicles. After a lengthy discussion, the Commission asked if the Department of Public Works would formalize a declaration of intention to transfer land originally taken for I-95, but never used, back to the Commission.
