

Dedham, Mass., Monday, April 16, 1923.

The COURT. This morning, as I understand, was assigned for the purpose of a hearing upon the question of the insanity of the defendant Sacco, and to hear and to consider the report of the alienists, together with any other evidence that may be introduced that may bear in any way upon the issue involved. What form do you recommend, Mr. District, that the hearing take this morning?

Mr. WILLIAMS. If your Honor please, you ^{have} before you, I assume, two letters from psychiatrists who have been assigned by the Court to examine the defendant Sacco. The first one dated March 26th, signed by Dr. Campbell; the second one dated April 10th, signed by Dr. Campbell and concurred in over the signatures of Drs. Cahoon, Thomas, Myerson and May.

The COURT. Will you read those reports?

Mr. WILLIAMS. I will do so. The first letter is dated March 26, 1923, addressed to Honorable Webster Thayer, Justice of the Superior Court, Worcester, Massachusetts.
